Blackfellows Falls country is situated north of Cunningham's Gap National Park and can be approached via the Gap and then heading north into the Goomburra Valley or alternatively can be reached via Laidley and Mount Sylvia. Our party will be approaching via 'the Gap. The vegetation is extremly interesting as it contains a merging of the western and eastern types and ranges from rain forest to brigalow and even bottle trees. The eastern side of the Great Dividing Range is sparsely timbered but the other side is of course, clothed in dense rain forest. There are several water falls in the area and it is to be hoped that there is sufficient water to make them as spectacular as they mostly are. It is ironic that so many club trips this year have been plagued by rain, whereas now that the weather has turned almost to drought, the water falls may lose some of their appeal. The big falls, which have a fallover of about 500 feet, come off the western edge of Mount Mistake and are situated in a stream about two miles above the junction with Blackfellow's Croek.

Where is the Guanaba Gorge ? It is situated on the eastern side of T_amborine Mountain and is quite spectacular with **its** towering rhyolitic cliffs and rain forested top. Near the top of the gorge are several examples of the ancient macrozamia palm and the countryside, which gives way to the flatter dairy farm paddocks as the mountain is left behind to the west, presents a striking contrast of mountain and river flat scenery.
