EDITORIAL

Committee has recently clarified the private trip situation in the club. It is hoped that the attention given to private trips will encourage a greater real interest in walking among Club members.

Until recently there were two distinct classes of trips - the private trips (for those in the know) and the Club trips organised by the Outings Secretary and advertised in the circular. Then came the "open private" trips which fitted neither category and caused quite some controversy.

The present policy is to have a good Club programme and to encourage private trips on the spare weekends.

It has been decided that private trip leaders may have any privately organised trip classed as a Club trip and will thus be free to advertise in the circular and give a report at the General Meeting. Of course, these trips should not clash with other Club activities and should be run in accordance with Club traditions. Since the Club will have no part in the finances, the trip should be run on a break-even basis.

A leader who wishes to have his trip given Club status should approach any Committee member before the Committee meeting prior to the trip (committee meetings are held on the 4th Monday of the month) with details of the trip - area to be visited, transport, etc. Permission to advertise in the next circular etc. will be readily given.

Old style private trips are still encouraged and if the leader wishes to report it at a meeting he should approach the Outings Secretary before the meeting. Written reports of any areas are always desired for Club files.

Remember, however, that the private trip is not the only avenue open to the ordinary Club member. The Outings Sub-Committee is always eager for trip suggestions and willing leaders. Don't forget the Club trips !

GENERAL

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1. "Exploratory throughwalks" are now to be included in the club's choice of trips. No pre-outing will have been done for these walks so they will be similar to preoutings in organisation and thus ideal walks for potential leaders.

Ample warning will be given of the nature of such trips so those participating do so at their own risk, but the risks will be no greater than for any other preouting. Such trips will have completely independent transport.

The recent Mt. Warning throughwalk was run on these lines and went smoothly. The support for this walk was encouraging.

2. Warning -

The Outings Secretary will now expect a full fare from Club Members who fail to cancel their nominations after deciding not to go on the trip. A phone call even ½ hour before the trip leaves, is common courtesy and saves other Club Members much inconvenience.

On the recent Mt. Moon daywalk no fewer than five persons were still missing when the bus left well after 9.00a.m.

CLUB NEWS & VIEWS

Following the good example given by two members at the August General Meeting in trying to rouse members out of apathy by following a philosophy that stirring is preferable to stagnation, it is pleasing to report that there was a complete absence of stagnation at the September General Meeting. Many members participated in the discussions which revolved round two topics.

1. First Aid Kits. The discussion took the form of considering the merits of the individual first aid kit compared with one "comprehensive" (not defined) kit that might be carried by a party. Consideration of the limitations and practical problems were also covered. The general view was considered to be that the present practice, which lays the emphasis on individual first aid kits, should be continued.

2. The "ideals" in an emergency officer system and the practical limitations thereof in various situations. While some sympathy was expressed to the view that emergency officers should inform parents when a party was more than several hours overdue, the general view tended to endorse the present system which places the onus of enquiry on the parent.

It will interest some people that there was no discussion on the concert proposal which received overwhelming support. As a result it is expected that the function will be held in February/March, 1970. It is now up to the Social Sub-Committee and the members who voted in favour of the proposal to combine and cooperate to make the function a big success in all respects. Persons interested in participating should let Kath Vingoe know they are able and <u>prepared</u> to participate fully which; of course, involves regular attendance at the many rehearsals.

In view of the increasing number of members driving vehicles and the increasing use of private transport on club outings, it is appropriate to bring to members' notice the Driver Education course being conducted by the Queensland Road Safety Council. The course continues for 4 weeks at 2 hours per week. There are four different times available, Tuesdays 5.30p.m. or 7.30p.m., Thursdays 5.30p.m. or 7.30p.m. Cost is only \$2.00. The lectures are held on the top floor of the Hibernian Building, 246 Queen Street. Next series commence on 21st and 23rd October.

The St. John Ambulance Brigade's next series of First Aid lectures commence on 23rd October and continue for a period of 8 weeks for two nights a week (Tuesday and Thursday). Cost of \$8.00 includes First Aid manual and triangular bandages. An examination is held at the end of the course and a certificate awarded.
