EDITORIAL.

Christmas greetings are extended to all Club members, both at home and overseas, and also to all other people who have helped the Club during the year. May the true religious significance of Christmas be remembered and may the coming year give us good weather, good walking and good luck.

One of the steps taken by your Committee to aid the new member and also to increase the enjoyment of the present member is to introduce the group system on overnight trips.

The idea of grouping, although new to our Club, is by no means an innovation in bushwalking circles, as some other associations have been operating successfully on this basis for many years. The main idea is that people signify on their trip nominations the names of persons they will closely be associated with during the trip. Usually such a group will camp near each other, will share the same fire or fires, will probably each be responsible for certain provisions and generally act as a team. Such a procedure is already unofficially in force in many instances.

It is believed that more people would like to take part in such a scheme and if such people approach the Outings Secretary or Committee members, efforts will be made to form new groups. These will help to form friendships, will assist newcomers and in general will provide full companionship to all concerned. One important factor will be that no person will be compelled to join a group if he does not feel inclined to do so.

Wherever possible, new members will be allocated to groups who are prepared to accept them and when nominating for trips it would be helpful if other members of the group were marked on the nomination form.

The group system is an imaginative attempt to improve the efficiency of the Club and it is hoped that it receives the support it deserves.

NEW BY-LAW.

Your Committee has seen fit to add a further By-Law to be incorporated

in accordance with the Club Constitution. It is set out for your guidance -

By-Law Number 8. "Any member wishing to announce or publicize any non Club activity at any Club meeting, outing or social function, shall first obtain the approval of the General Committee or its nominees."

VACANCY FOR OUTINGS RECORDER AND ALSO COMMITTEE MEMBER.

With the resignation of Margaret Kennedy from the position of Outings Recorder and the return of Col. McLellan to the Vice Presidency, vacancies exist for the positions of (1) OUTINGS RECORDER, and (2) COMMITTEE MEMBER. Under Section 7 (IV) of the Constitution, the positions are declared vacant as at the meeting of December 18th, 1961, and nominations are called to fill the vacancies accordingly. Nominations must be in writing, bearing the signature of the nominator, nominee and a seconder (all of whom must be financial members of the Club for 1961/62) and must reach the Secretary not later than Monday January 8th, 1962. Should more than one nomination be received for either position, a ballot will be held. THE POSITIONS WILL BE FILLED AT THE GENERAL MEETING ON JANUARY 15TH.

JANUARY WEEKEND TRIP TO NOOSA HEADS - JANUARY 26/29th, 1962.

The Noosa district is particularly interesting, embracing rugged cliff

lines, rain forest clad ridges, graded tracks and coastal scenery at its best. The club will be camping in the public reserve adjacent to the Noosa River and the Reserve is noted for its shady trees.

The Noosa district, or Neusa, as it was spelt in the early days, was first explored by Andrew Petrie and Henry Stuart Russell in an open boat in the forties of the last century. Coming across an escaped convict named Bracefell near here, they named the area "Bracefell's Head" and it retained this name for some time. Timber getting developed the district and the gazettal of a National Park some years ago gave it a variety of scenery not often obtained in coastal resorts. From Noosa Hill (482 ft) extensive views can be obtained including magnificent vistas of the 40 mile beach running north to Double Island Point, Rain forest is found in the Park-reserve and bird life is abundant. The graded track system leads past such famous cliff formations as the Boiling Pot, Devil's Kitchen and the awe inspiring Hell's Gates. The Paradise Cave at the Coolum end of the beach is well worth a visit in low tide.

It is hoped that arrangements can be made for the party to visit the famous Teewah coloured sends. This entails a launch trip across the river and a fantastic run up the beach in a battered old army truck. Due to some geological formation, the sand at Teewah varies in colour from black to white with shades of browns and yellows.
