TASMANIA'S UNTAMED HEART: (Part 1)

Tasmania falls like a tear drop from the continent of Australia. A small sea girt state, comprising 26,215 sq. miles in area, it is famed for its picturesque lakes, impetuous rivers, rugged mountains, beautiful waterfalls and steep gorges. Though small in size (a little freckle as it were, on the map of the world), Tesmania, especially Western Tesmania, is acclaimed one of Australia's finest mountain resorts. The South west corner of the island is still virtually uninhabited it is covered with scrub of incredible density which has defied the explorer even to this day. Here in 1960, Sir Edmund Hillary of Mount Everest fame was turned back in an attempt to explore a peak.

Situated in the centre of Western Tasmania is the Lake St. Clair - Cradle Mountain National Park, a scenic reserve and wild life sanctuary. From Waldheim at the Northern end of the park to Cynthia Bay at the South is approximately 60 miles through an area of 336,000 acres. The inaccessability of the Cradle Mountain Reserve is part of its lure and has been aptly termed the "Untamed Heart of Tasmania." Since the area is uninhabited and has no through roads, all supplies must be carried by pack and sufficient to last at least five days. Primitive huts, at convenient distances apart provide shelter. The track is clearly defined and marked but anyone doing the trip is advised to travel well equipped as extremes of weather may be experienced, and also in a party with three as a minimum for safety. The latter advice I disregarded convinced that with proper precautions, the true way to enjoy the wonders of the Reserve and capture the spirit of the early pioneers who penetrated into the region over a century ago without maps or tracks, was to wander alone.

The trip from Cradle Mountain to Lake St. Clair offers a great variety of scenery to the hiker and a wealth of botanical and geological wonders to the scientist. Some scientists claim that this area represents the remant of a lost Continent - a Continent which extended to South America

from which marsupials migrated and became modified in form in Australasia. The deciduous beech, commonly called "Fagus," the only native tree which looses its leaves in autumn, shows affinity to the South American beech. The Grass trees are living fossils of the Mesozoic age, when great palm trees and grass trees flourished. Now only this highland remains while the rest of the continent has weathered away and lies buried forever beneath the Southern Ocean.

My journey through the Reserve began at Waldheim. Here a Ranger resides and visitors are expected to inform him of their proposed movements. A chalet and the newly erected cottages provide accommodation. The chalet is built of pine, hewn and dressed by axe. Quaint and rustic, even primitive, yet comfortable, it harmonizes with the wild surroundings. It was erected in 1912 by Gustaf We indofer who came originally on a botanical expedition and became popularly known as the "Hermit of Cradle Mountain." A native of Tyrol, he saw in the rugged peaks, pine forests, valleys and hills, a likeness to his native land. He called the place "Waldheim" (mountain home) and he lived there for over twenty years. An excellent linguist and student of natural history, he frequently contributed to scientific journals in Europe and America. There is vivid evidence of his love of nature and wild life in the tamed kangaroos and oppossums that approach the chalet with no fear of humans, and accept food proferred to them by visitors.

Before leaving Waldheim a visit to the wayside museum is well worth while. When I began my five day trek, mist obscured the landmarks and distant peaks, while Cradle Mountain with its columnar precipices frowned down at me as I swung southward across the valley. My pack weighed 40 lbs. if not more and seemed to grow heavier as, following the track which rapidly ascends the plateau, I skirted the mountain below the dolerite scree slopes and approached the ridge known as the "Cirque." On my right three thousand feet below lay Crater Lake, misnamed, as it lies in no crater, but in a glacial hollow gouged out long ago by icy torrents. Here all around me was evidence

of the long process of reduction by wind and water erosion assisted by glacial action in the highlands and valleys. Erratics and boulders carried by glaciers lay deposited far from their place of origin, while green hummochs and terminal morraine acted as dams forming picturesque little lakes and tarns. Examples of these formations are also to be seen on the ridge between Cradle Mountain and Barn Bluff. Barn Bluff, a pillar of rock 5,114 feet in height gradually unfolded itself as the morning mist, like a curtain, slowly rolled itself back to the sky.

An alternative route is over Hansen's peak, rather steep for anyone with a heavy pack. This track leads one t the southern side of the Cradle on to Lake Rodway where a new Chalet has been built by the Launceston Walking Club as a memorial to a teacher and pupil who perished there in 1967 and well deserves a visit. This was for another occasion, so I pressed on and from the summit of the cirque some 4,000 feet above sea level the track fell away sharply into a valley aptly named waterfall Valley. Here in this sequestered valley is a small hut and on this occasion I stopped to boil the billy before proceeding on to open country and Lake Windemere.

As early as 1821, George Augustus Robinson, famed as a conciliator of the Tasmanian aboriginals, penetrated this region seeking the aboriginal murderers of a Captain B. Thomas. Again in 1834, Robinson mentions a frightful trip when he was waist deep in snow drifts. He is also credited with bringing in the remnants of the last aborigina tribe, which had concentrated in this area. Now there was no sign of life and no living creature to dispute my choice or obstruct my path. Two hundred yards from Lake Windemere was the hut, crude and unadorned; yet despite its crudeness, it proved to be a haven of rest and provided shelter from the cold night air.

LAST MONTH'S TRIPS:

November, traditionally the month for exams and very serious study, was a less active than normal month so far as walking activity was concerned.

Nevertheless, on 9th. November, Garth Comerford led a merry band of nineteen people from Brockfield to the Gap via. Gold Creek. Transport by courtesy of the B.C.C. proved most exciting and the leader excelled himself in having Mr. Whippy brought to the party. An enjoyable, relatively easy day walk, appropriate for the weather conditions.

On 21st. to 23rd. November, a total of thirtyfour members attended a S. & T. weekend at the end of Logan's Gorge in a very satisfactory setting, despite the rather long walk in, so far as base-camps go. Saturday's training sessions had their complications and the weather was rather rude for much of the morning. However it provided a grand opportunity for a demonstration on how to light a fire in damp conditions without the assistance of any volatile liquid. Firstaid, Navigation, Abseiling techniques and camping techniques were covered in varying degrees of thoroughness in the limited time available. Sunday's navigation exercise over six to eight miles took six hours. Splitting such a large party into only two groups limited the usefulness of the exercise, as did the apparent lack of enthusiasm clearly evident in some of the party. Nevertheless the experience will be helpful in organising future events of this nature. But oh! so few took their first aid kits on this walk!

A hurried departure from the campsite gave certain members of the party an unfair amount of cleaning up to do. It's amazing how the pleading (?) that each person be responsible for his own rubbish tends to fall on deaf ears. The last minute absence of Fr. Kechane through illness, caught quite a few unprepared for the sophistication of the city, when the party returned to Brisbane for Mass at the Cathedral.
