WEEKEND TRIP TO MOUNT ERNEST - JUNE 8/10TH. Base Camp and Through Walk. Nominations of 30/- to reach Club Box by Friday June 1st. Bus leaves Redline Depot on the Friday at 6.30p.m. (Tamborine Bus) and Leaders are Jim Collins for Base Camp (56.4279) and Barry Ferro (97.4277) for through walk. Mount Ernest rises to 2,455ft. and is situated immediately between Barney and Lindsay. It is on Ernest that the Logan River is formed and Cronan's Creek also flows between Barney and Ernest to join the Logan immediately to the east of Ernest. The normal ascent of the mountain is made up a spectacular razor back near the Cronan Creek junction and the views obtained from the summit are truly spectacular. To the north and south rise the two giants and the mass of Ballow is visible to the west. Looking eastward over Campbell's Folly the main MacPherson Ranges stand out with O'Reilly's Guesthouse visible on a fine day. The camp site will be situated on . a very beautiful stretch of the Logan River. The Through walkers will be taken to the Border Gate and will climb Ernest on the Saturday. They will probably have time to attempt Campbell's Folly also, and will then follow the river downstream and will meet the bus some miles downstream on the Sunday. The base campers will visit Campbell's Folly on the Sunday as this is a short climb from the camp site. Several caves and orchid grottoes are accessible from the top of this mountain. People who consider that they have seen Barney and Lindesay in all their imposing grandeur must surely scale Ernest before they can make this statement with real confidence and we hope that all will take advantage of this trip. Bring water bottles as the mountain is quite dry. Contact Officer for this trip is Byron Moss (89.1313). A contact Officer should not be approached for details of a coming trip. The idea is that parents be informed of the contact officer immediately before the trip commences so that in the event of the party being delayed overnight or for some hours, the parents could check with the Contact Officer. The Leader would always let him be the first person to know of any delay or reason for late coming. DAY WALK TO MT. WALKER - SUNDAY JUNE 17TH. Nominations of 15/- to Club Box by June 8th. Bus leaves Anzac Square (Adelaide Street) at 9.0a.m. Leader Peter Murphy. "The summit of the mountain presents a narrow level ridge which contracts northerly until it becomes a sharp ledge of rocks having on its eastern and western sides

precipitous falls of 200 feet." So wrote Alan Cunningham of his ascent of Mt. Walker on August 25th. 1828. At that time it was known as Mt. Forbes, so named by John Oxley on his 1824 voyage up the Brisbane River. At. Walker is situated west of Flinders Peak and east of the Little Liverpool Range and divides the waters of the Bremer River and Worrell Creek. Hising to 1,540 feet, it is neither a difficult nor arduous ascent. It gives spectacular views of the Great Divide, the MacPhersons, the D'aguilar and the Teviot Ranges and the picturesque Fassifern farming districts in the foreground. This is a day walk that takes in normal week-end country and with Flinders Peak is probably the best vantage point in the area. Bring full water bottles and bring them early to allow a punctual start to be made as there is so much to see on this trip.
