MONTHLY CIRCULAR

EDITORIAL. by Larry Corkran.

Several late "re-entries" of Club trips in the last few months have caused Committee some concern. Leaders should realise that the late return of a trip may upset only some of the members but would worry nearly all parents. There are more details elsewhere in this circular on Committee moves to prevent such happenings in the future and on the functioning of the Emergency Officer system.

Some Committee ideas on Club trips may not appeal to our best walkers. Remember however that there is the alternative of private trips for those who want to visit unusual areas, do harder walks, or make greater use of Sundays for walking.

Private trips have tended to fade out of late, but why? More Club members now have cars. This should make transport easier to arrange and should enable more distant places to be visited.

The Club needs people who will increase Club knowledge of new areas. Therefore give private trips more consideration but don't forget to tell the Club about them. Bring slides to meetings or write a brief report for the Club files - or both.

The Club also needs people who are prepared to lead Club walks now and then. Club walks were where you learned the trade; now there are new faces who want you to teach them. That is the role of the Club.

The best two things you can do for your Club are (1) organize private trips that enhance the Club's walking reputation and (2) encourage the "juniors" by leading a Club trip.

PLEASE NOTE:

EMERGENCY OFFICER SYSTEM:

The Club's Emergency Officers are:-Michael Laherty- 97 6303 Kevin Herlihy- 39 2309.

The twofold purpose of the Emergency Officer system is:-

(1) to provide the link between members on walks, and other members, for the purposes of any emergency search and/or rescue operation, whether it be a Club or Federation call out.

(2) to provide the link between members on walks, and parents on occasions where trips are late in returning, i.e. after 8.30p.m. on the relevant day.

Effective operation of the system when a trip is late in returning involves the following:-

(a) Where transport is by bus the leader will contact the Emergency Officer no later than 8.30p.m. informing of the situation and the estimated time of arrival back in Brisbane. He again contacts the Emergency Officer to advise him the trip has returned.

(b) Where transport is by cars, and the trip is likely to return late, the leader notifies the Emergency Officer of the situation; the estimated time of return to Brisbane; the names of the car drivers and their passengers. Individual drivers will notify the Emergency Officer giving similar information where unexpected delays may have occurred and a later return than previously envisaged, results.

Parents may reassure themselves when their sons/ daughters have not returned, by contacting the Emergency Officer, but not before 9.00p.m. It may reassure them to know that while the aim is generally AUGUST 1969. MONTHLY CIRCULAR Page 8.

to be back in Brisbane by 8.30p.m. it is not unusual for a trip to return at a later hour. Emergency Officers should be contacted in the order listed for the particular outing.

As a matter of Club policy, the leader of each outing carries with him a list of the names, addresses and telephone numbers of each person on the outing, whether a member or a visitor, so that direct contact with parents could be made if the need should ever arise.

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I PREACH TO THE LEPERS:

William Dampier certainly did not like the looks of this country. The bold marauder was probably the first white man to set foot on the rocky, inhospitable shore near Broome, ustralia. It was not, of course, called Broome then. William took one good, brief look around and later described the place as the most undesirable he had ever seen, "peopled by dirty, fly-blown creatures."

Broome, Australia, is in a territory popularly known today as "The Kimberleys." It is a vast territory in the North West of this island continent and into its barren wastes could be tucked, with room to spare, Ireland, England, Scotland, Wales, France and a few other European states.

Some two hundred years after William the buccaneer had shaken the sands of the Kimberleys from his shoes, a small party of Trappist monks waded ashore from a lugger. They proceeded to establish a mission for the purpose of evangelizing the descendants of Dampier's "fly blown creatures." Clearing the dense brush and working under the rigors of a tropical climate, they built huts of timber and paper-like bark. Water was obtained by boring for it and utilized to grow vegetables which formed the staple diet of the monks.

These Trappists toiled, prayed and fasted for ten years. Then, as Thomas Merton in his book, "Waters of Siloe," says, they were forced by circumstances and rule to abandon the work begun in sweat and tears.

Yet, their labors were not in vain. Their going left a void which was filled some fifty years ago by the Pallottine Fathers and the Sisters of St. John of God.

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Meanwhile Broome had been founded and was living its own peculiar history. Remote and isolated from ordinary Australian commercial life, once considered the greatest pearling town in the world, Broome today glories only in its past. It was near the present township that, in 1874, the famous Southern Cross Pearl was found. It was picked up on a reef by a native who sold it to a white man for a bottle of gin. It passed through many hands and ultimately reached the legitimate gem markets of the world where it was sold for £27,000!

Since the discovery of the Southern Cross the number of lives lost in the local quest for pearls may be roughly estimated from the town cemetery. There are at least 500 Japanese buried there in what is probably the largest Japanese graveyard outside Japan. The graves of hundreds of others, Chinese, Malay and Indonesian, tell of those who failed and paid dearly with their lives for failure. Natives will tell you that for every one buried in the graveyards of Broome, there is at least another whose bones lie fathoms deep in the treacherous pearl-bearing waters.

I stopped off at Broome to preach a brief mission there and had the most, polygot, neterogeneous congregation of whites, blacks, halfcasts, Koepangs and Malays I have ever shen. Broome certainly showed off the universality of the Church in miniature. Unlike St. Francis Xavier, however, my hands were wearied neither by Baptisms nor by absolutions. I only hope that the Recording Angel while having little in the way of successes to register, will at least mark down my efforts.

From Broome, I continued on north towards the tropics and the town of Derby, a place so drab, dusty and parched it looks as if it were dehydrated. It was soon obliterated behind us in a cloud of dust rising like a smoke screen from the wheels of the truck as we cut across miles of mudflats towards the leprosarium.

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Leprosy, scourge of mankind since the dawn of history, was dreaded in ancient Egypt, Medieval Europe, in China, India and Africa where it is prevalent today. The scourge raised its head in the tropical north of Australia towards the end of the last century when Orientals were introduced to work, especially in the pearl fishing industry.

The aboriginal way of life prevailing here, the lack of hygiene, and customs such as passing chewed tobacco from mcuth to mouth, were added impetus to the spread of the disease. Federal and State governments sought to check its spread by establishing leprosaria at various centers.

At the request of the government, the Sisters of St. John took over the nursing at the leprosarium outside Derby. As the number of patients increased, the original institution gradually developed into a unique colony, with quarters for the officials, a convent for the nuns, comfortable huts for the patients, flower gardens, green lawns and a generating plant to supply electricity.

The place became a sort of utopian oasis in the bush with everything provided for the patients except a place in which to worship God. Most of the work is done by the patients who are well cared for and receive a regular issue of tobacco and clothing and a free day each week to go off on picnics. The horrible sights of running sores and living corpses which I had visualized on my long trip up here were few and far between.

Most of the patients live an almost normal life, for the leprosy germ works very slowly, albeit persistently. It seldom kills the patient directly but opens the way for other diseases such as tuberculosis or Bright's Disease.

Some popular areas have already had as much rubbish buried as the ground can take.

In future, more effort will be made to have trips arrive back in Brisbane at a reasonable hour - in time for the 7.30p.m. Mass at the Cathedral or by 8.30p.m. if Mass has been attended elsewhere. It is the responsibility of leaders to leave the camp area in time to be back by these times. If necessary "goodies stops" can be missed. To this end also, was the resolution that if an area is unfamiliar to the leader, throughwalks be cancelled if no pre-outing can be done. If for some reason the trip is not back by the times stated, the leader must notify the Emergency Officer.

Would Club members support another extended outing next New Year? Areas suggested so far are (1) the Warrumbungles and (2) the Many Peaks Range near Gladstone.
