JANUARY LONG WEEKEND - 24/27TH - O'REILLYS SECTION OF LAMINGTON NATIONAL PARK. Leader Rosemary O'Brien. Nominations of 25/- (bargain price) to Club Box by January 20th. Bus leaves 16 Roma Street 6.30 p.m. on the Friday.

Acclaimed throughout the Nation as one of Australia's most highly regarded National Parks, Lamington offers mountain scenery on the grand scale. O'Reillys Guest House is situated on the north west section of the Park and in the starting point for many really spectacular trips. The many waterfalls of the Canungra Creeks can be visited by the most inexperienced walker and the rain forest enshrouded fairyland lookouts of the main MacPherson Range can be comfortably reached in two hours. This is a particularly fine area for a bushwalking career to commence.

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Veteran walkers will be well aware of the many places of interest off the beaten track and everyone will no doubt have a favourite spot to visit. The morning scene from the camp site usually is a view of mist covered lowlands with grey green peaks and ridges cutting through the mist in the whole western perimeter. One word of warning.Advise the trip leader if you wish to attempt any trip other than the official ones so that your destination will be known to responsible people. 50,000 acres is a big area and it is essential that strict cohesion be maintained amongst all club members on this trip. Also remember that this is a three day trip so plan your tucker accordingly.

<u>EASE CAMP - FEBRUARY 14/16TH - NUMINBAH VALLEY</u> Leader Mike Laherty. Nominations of 30/- to Club Box by Friday February 7th. Bus leaves 16 Roma Street on the Friday.

Numinbah Valley, known to the aborigines as the "Place of Devils" contains the Nerang River. This stream rises in the south eastern portion of Lamington National Park under the mighty ramparts of Wagawn, Orchid Bower and Ship's Stern. Well known tributory streams include Cave Creek dropping from Springbrook via Natural Arch and Nixon's or Ballanjui Creek flowing over the falls of the same name and then winding past Turtle and Egg Rocks to join the parent stream a little to the north.

The camp site will be on the main Nerang River adjacent to the road and about three miles north of Natural Arch. Turtle Rock represents a climb of about 1,000 feet and tunnels and caves formed by volcanic lava being pressure forced through older rock, will be visited. Even in mid-summer the caverns are quite chilly. They are also pitch dark in sections and torches are handy. Several waterfalls on Springbrook will be visible and exceptionally good views of the Binna Burra section of Lamington National Park including Egg Rock are readily obtainable from Turtle Rock. Southwards are the awe inspiring cliffs of Ship's Stern.

An interesting trip that is not particularly strenuous **is** to proceed to the state border by road and follow the border fence westwards to the Rock Wallaby Caves underneath a vantage spot known as Point Lookout. This used to be an access point to Mount Wagawn 2,000 feet higher up but the rough track is almost obliterated. The Caves are really overhangs and are referred to in detail in Arthur Grooms "One

If the weather is suitable a might visit to Natural Arch to view the glow worms is well within walking distance of the camp site.
