FRIDAY - APRIL 24TH - GRAND CONCERT - ALL SAINTS HALL, ANN STREET. 8 P.M.

SUNDAY - APRIL 26TH - DAY WALK - FLINDERS PEAK Nominations of 12/6 to Club Box by Wednesday 22nd April. Bus departs Anzac Equare 9 a.m. LEADER - PETER RICE. Bring full water bottles.

There is perhaps no other mountain that lominates the skyline in the Moreton District as conspicuously as Flinders Peak. Although its 2247 feet is negligible compared with the 4000 feet plus of the border ranges, its dominance over its companion peaks of the Teviot Range and the symmetrical beauty of its lofty ridges make it one of the more important of our bushwalking goals. Situated about 12 miles south of Ipswich, the views from its summit embrace every point of the compass. Ascending the mountain via a well wooded ridge, the party traverses an easy but extremely exciting razorback and before reaching the summit cairn can digress a short distance to most interesting small caves. The sheer cliffs to the north and the east and the great columnar "thumb" are particularly striking.

The cattle country in which this range is situated is typical of the real outback and phtotgraphers can attempt some real Namatjira like shots. Nobody can claim to have even commenced their bushwalking career until they have climbed Flinders Peak.

THREE DAY WEEKEND - MAY 1/4TH - BALD ROCK AND BOONOO BOONOO.

Nominations of £2.5.-. to Club Box by Tuesday 28th April. Bus departs 16 Roma Street, 6.30 p.m. on the Friday. <u>LEADER</u> - JIM COLLINS.

If ever a trip was worth £2.5.-., this surely would be it. The fascinating world of the granite strewn portion of the Great Dividing Range embracing the area we traverse this weekend is completely different to the country nearer Brisbane. Bald Rock National Park includes the vast dome like Bald Rock which rises to a height of close on 4500 feet, higher even than the redoubtable Barney itself. The delightful Bald Rock creek, sometimes spreading to a width of 50 ports, sometimes diving underground to emerge further along in a labyrinth of great rounded grotesque leaning boulders, is itself a revelation.

A few miles north of Tenterfield is an old track winding 8 miles to the east and terminating alongside a great pool at the head of the foaming leaping 600 feet cascades known as the Boonoo Boonoo falls. Situated in very isolated country, these falls are on the headwaters of a main tributary stream of the mighty Clarence River and once seen, they are always remembered.

What else will be done on this variety strewn weekend? A few miles south of Tenterfield, there rises from the western ridges a vast Gibraltar like peak known as Bluff Rock. Although it entails an easy climb of only 800 feet, the ascent is quite spectacular. Then again, on the return through Stanthorpe, there is Thunderbolts Cave and an interesting waterfall to visit a short distance to the west.

Remember that weather conditions will be cold. There is no doubt on this point. Remember also that Sunday night will be spent in a caravan park in Tenterfield after Sunday evening Mass. Sunset will be at about 5.15 p.m. and consequently early morning starts will be necessary to enable the many varied and interesting sights to be enjoyed by the party.

In good weather the creeks a little to the north are as picturesque as any of the more favoured streams to the south but unfortunately the watercourses can dry our rapidly Bring full waterbottles.
