PROPOSED CLUB HUT AT MT. BARNEY

Most Club Members know the Lower Portals of Mt. Barney and the wonderful country which extends around this area.

Barney Creek runs its serpentine course through stately bush and broad sunny clearings with the rush of its water calmed every now and again by long deep pools which are such a delight on a summer's day.

A Club Hut in this country which is a bushwalker's paradise would be a great asset from which many club members would derive a lot of benefit.

Prolonged stays in this area would allow a great variety of walks to be done with the Hut as a base.

The proposal of such a hut has been made possible by a very generous offer from the Drynan Family who own the land, and they have offered to help with the gathering of materials.

It is suggested that the design of the Hut be basically simple to allow for easy but solid construction from materials in the area - respecting the difficulties of transportation.

Rocks of all shapes and sizes abound in the creek where there is also an ample supply of good concreting gravel. Mr. Drynan has also offered to select the most suitable timber to withstand rotting.

When completed the hut would be able to serve two purposes to provide shelter and be a shrine where Mass may be said from time to time. Thus, both the material and spiritual aims of the Club would be well served.

This proposal is put to Club Members as a challenge with the guar intee that the hard work will achieve for the Club a lasting asse; of which it may well be proud.
