<u>Sunday July 28th - Day Walk - Brookfield District</u>. Nominations of 12/6d. to Club Box by 22nd July. Bus leaves Tourist Bureau 9.15. a.m. sharp. Bring full water bottles. Leader Claire Maguire.

This walk will traverse an offshoot of the Taylor Range and gives good walking in the area between Mount Cootha and the Daguilar Range. Good views of the Enoggera Reserveir and Ipswich are ensured and the western range to Cunningham's Gap and the Barney district should be visible. Also highlighting this trip should be the vivid colouring of the wattle trees for which the northern slopes of the Taylor Range are noted. Bushfires usually cause heavy damage but our wet autumn should ensure that our national emblem is blooming at its very best.

<u>Bowling Night - Wednesday July 31st</u>. Our Social Committee is now swinging into action and an ever popular bowling excursion at Greenslopes Lanes has been arranged for 6p.m. Nominations close at Club Box on Wednesday 24th July. Send no money but address letter to Social Secretary. After the ten-pinning, we descend on Reslyn Andrews' home at 47 Wellington Street, Coorparco for supper and more festivities. Admittance here is 2/and some eatables for supper. Weekend August 2/4th - Through Walk Mount Cordeaux to Mount Castle. Bus leaves Tamborine Depot 6.30 p.m. Friday and nominations of 30/- should reach Club Box by Friday the 26th July. Leader Brian Hart.

This very popular through walk should be supported heavily by Club Members. The party will travel to Cunningham's Gap and will utilise the graded track system to set up camp on the saddle between Cordeaux and Morgan's Lookout. The early morning scene from this vantage point of nearly 4000 feet will take in the Tarome Valley in the immediate vicinity, the Barney Ballew district to the south, the whole MacPherson Range to the south east and the rock bound ramparts to the north. Wending through mossy tendrils of Particularly beautiful rain forest, including the Victorian type of tree fern, the party will proceed in a northerly direction, being rewarded with stupendous views of the eastern cliff line äs they go. The interesting Razorback and Hole in the Wall will be covered on the Sunday and the party will descent via one of the spurs of Mount Castle. Bring very warm clothing and water bottles for this trip. At Morgan's Lookout and at several other points the altitude is over 4000 feet and sleet has been known to fall during bad weather.

Wednesday August 14th - Annual Mount Barney Mass - Nominations of 30/- to Club Box by Wednesday August 7th. Bus leaves Tamborine Depot 6.30. p.m. Tuesday 13th.
