GENERAL MEETINGS

Meetings are held on the 3rd Monday of every month, at 7:30pm. The location is St Brigid's Parish Hall, Musgrave Rd, RED HILL. VISITORS are always welcome.

OUTINGS

- (a) Always read the Jilalan article to check the departure point, date and time.
- (b) Walk departures are usually from Red Hill Parish Hall, Musgrave Rd. Check "Jilalan" or phone the leader to determine the location.
- (c) The club will usually organise transport for each outing, but you must nominate in advance to the leader. Contacting someone else may lead to your nomination becoming "lost". Nominations should preferably be made by the Monday prior to the activity (Wednesday at the latest) so that transport etc. can be arranged. Note that nominations for some walks may close well in advance of this. Late nominations may not be accepted.
- (d) Walkers are responsible for their own transport to and from the departure point.
- (e) Walks are rarely cancelled if they are, all nominees will be notified. Should you change your mind and decide not to come to a club event, please notify the leader as soon as possible.

(f) Visitors who have done more than 3 walks must sign an Assumption of Risk form for insurance. EMERGENCY OFFICER

If, within the hour prior to an outing's departure, you can't make it or you are running late, phone the number shown in the Jilalan for the Emergency Officer for that outing. If you have not returned from an outing by 9:00pm your family may ring the Emergency Officer – but please don't panic.

EQUIPMENT HIRE

The Club has some tents and through-walk packs to hire to visitors and newer members. Borrowers are responsible for collecting and returning equipment, as well as making good any loss or damage over and above normal wear and tear. Hire rates – Packs \$10/ weekend, Tents \$5:00 – Deposit of \$20:00 required.

PERSONAL EOUIPMENT

The Association requires that all walkers on all trips should carry certain minimal basic equipment. This should comprise the following – a first aid kit, a torch, a parka/raincoat, hat, shirt 30+ sunscreen and at least 2 litres of water. Leaders may require that walkers carry other equipment. Advice of this will be given in Jilalan and/or by the leader. MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

All members are most welcome to attend a meeting of the Management Committee, but please contact the President beforehand. This means you can be advised of any change of date/venue. If you feel strongly about an issue, bring it along to the Committee Meeting and we'll put it on the agenda.

Coomera Creek Circuit Saturday 7th Dec Dawalk

Coomera Creek Circuit is one of the best rainforest walks in south east Queensland. The walk starts at the Binna Burra and goes along the border track for about 2 km. We then turn right and head down to the top of the Coomera Gorge. The vegetation on this section is open eucalypt forest rather then rainforest and apparently it is

due to the different bedrock here of the less fertile Rhyolite rock whereas most of the rainforest is on the more fertile basalt rock.

At the top of the Gorge there are some great vantage points. I haven't had a chance to do a pre-outing to check the new viewing platform so I can only presume we will have great views of Coomera Falls and Yarrabilong Falls. In my opinion these falls are the most spectacular in South East and have Old been photographed extensively for the Wilderness Calendars by people like Robert Rankin and Steve Parish. The falls are over 150 m high. The cliff sides are covered in a carpet of ferns and lilies with a line of sparkling clear water shooting out from a crevice in the rainforest. Definitely worth a lengthy camera stop.

We then follow the track as it crisscrossess the Coomera creek. Hopefully we will get to see some of the blue and white Lamington spiny crayfish along this section of the creek. I plan to have lunch at Bahnamboola Falls, if it is not too wet. We then head up to the Border Track. Rather then head back to Binna Burra we will make a quick detour to the McPherson Range escarpment and enjoy the views of Mt Warning and the Tweed Valley from Yargabullang Lookout.

We then follow the Border Track back to Binna Burra and a quick refreshment break at the coffee shop. So come along and enjoy a classic Binna Burra bushwalk.

The distance is long but it is all on graded track, so it shouldn't be too hard but please note there are several creek crossings on slippery rocks. Just remember Paddy Pallin's famous words "The only bushwalks I regretted were the ones I didn't go on".

We followed the unnamed rocky ridge to the gorge and had clear views of the peaks of Mt Barney. Good views of Mt Maroon. Currawongs and Noisy Friar Birds overhead gave out raucous calls.

We enjoyed a refreshing lunch and cuppa at the gorge junction and I completed the site monitoring at this campsite. The camp site had little leaf cover. There were also signs of use. We returned to the hut by rock hopping down the creek, which was the first time for some of the party. Water levels were low and the rock hopping was no problem. We also saw grass trees, lomandra and bottlebrush in flower. We were back at the hut by mid-afternoon for a final break.

After an hour we were back at the cars. On our return trip we enjoyed a relaxing break at Rathdowney. Thanks to those for coming along. Bellbird Lookout and Caves Walk Sunday 27 October 2002

Seven of us were to meet at St Brigid's at 7am for a good day in the cool rainforests at Binna Burra.

Unfortunately the three visitors were unable to make it due to pressing work commitments. Hence four of us set off in Michael's car for the start of the walk. Driving through light rain and mist, Mary and Michael Nolan, Terry and myself wondered what the weather would do.

This was my first official walk as leader so I had done my homework! Iain had told me that if you do a club walk at Binna Burra in the Lamington National Park you must have lamingtons for the troupe. So on arrival we had morning tea with lamingtons. I had won favour with my group (bribery number 1!). Round one was accomplished!

Then the heavens opened and down came the rain! Terry wished he had stayed home to watch the Indy on television. How long would this rain last? I changed plans. We walked down the road in the rain (heavy drizzle I called it!). You could just see Egg Rock through the mist. With the descriptive brochure I was able to give a description of the different phases of the walk. That was interesting. Actually we realized that the walk would be different as we would see things from a different angle with the light drizzle. We heard the water rushing down Coomera Creek and noisy white cockatoos. Who would be first to see a koala? (Bribery number 2 - a Freddo frog for the person with the keenest eyes!) At the overhang where Michael described the rock features Freddo frogs were welcomed to keep the energy going until we reached the car again. Who had spotted Mary spotted a pademelon. a koala? Would that do? I found a huge worm on

the track while at the next bend Michael saw a snake with its head raised or was it a stick? Not to be outdone Terry realized that two pythons were curled around the vine above the track. On closer inspection they were actually two large vines curled around each other. I thought the two fellows had very good imaginations so Freddo frogs were awarded to everyone.

Although we walked five kilometres it took us two hours for we had many stops to take in the sights and to understand the workings of a rainforest, not to mention the constant laughter and funny stories! We viewed Kweebani Cave, walked through the hole in the rock, saw lichens as green and white patches on the rocks, felt the spray on our faces and watched the mist transform the Coomera Valley into Brigadoon. Great sights. I hope we have some great photos.

Then we followed the Bellbird trail to the lookout over the Numinbah Valley to see the prison farm behind Egg Rock. Yes, Terry, the Gold Coast Indy would be rain soaked so just as well you are not there! Two obliging ghosts took our photo for the club records. Terry found the abseiling cliff. No, Terry, you can't get to the Indy that way! We also marvelled at the sight of Bigfoot, the huge tallow wood tree several hundred years old.

Returning to the car we had lunch under the information shelter. Our walk was concluded with more lamingtons, a hot cup of tea and exchanging the highlights of the walk.

Runing Creek Falls October 5th - 6TH Iain Renton

They reckon you remember the best bits in life and gradually forget the less pleasant things. Well, all three of us had done this walk before, and all agreed it was a good deal rougher then we remembered. In spite of that, it was a great day's walking.

Desley and I arrived at the Lamington Bridge camping ground at sunset on Saturday. (They now have a selfregistration system here. We had enough remaining daylight to unpack and pitch our tents. We then cooked and ate a leisurely meal with a good deal of yakking along the way.

Bill arrived bright and early the next morning and after breakfast we set off over Chingee Gap. We left the cars at 8:00am. It was fine and sunny with just a hint of a cooling breeze.

Bill, having led the walk a few years ago, was navigator. We walked across open paddocks and then along a well worn foot pad that wound its way above a series of steep gullies choked with vegetation. (Bill told us the tales of one walk that had drifted into that unfriendly terrain.) There were signs a bushfire had been through the area (and along some of Black Snake Ridge). As a result we didn't have to worry about lantana or undergrowth on this section).

After crossing the creek (near the junction of North and South branches) and passing through extended palm groves, the walking became less easy and not so straight forward. As the path headed to higher ground it became more indistinct and we began to keep a sharp eye for route markers of red, yellow and white plastic tape.

Frequent fallen trees had to be clambered over or around then you would often spend time finding the track again. We finally reached England Creek, it didn't look very far from the earlier crossing on the map, but it took quite a while to get there.

After morning tea on Running Creek, we crossed to the other side and angled over the ridge to get to the falls. There were no paths here, and it was a matter of climbing over rocks, clambering through vines and dodging or disentangling ourselves from lawyer vines (wait-a-while). This was slow going and Bill reckoned there was much less wait-a-while last time.

Back at the creek we did a short rock-hop to our lunchspot on a large rock slab with a good view of the fulldrop of the falls. After lunch and a cuppa we didn't linger long as time was running out. There were more tangles back over the ridge with Bill getting a bit cut-up about things (literally and figuiratively) untangling himself from wait-a-while. He also had a slight brush with a gympie bush. We all had our tangles, cuts and tumbles.

Back on the taped section the males took turns at finding and losing the track and Desley's eagle-eye often spotted markers in the rainforest tangle. We were by now debating whether we would need torches to finish the walk. In the end we didn't, but only just! It was a marvelous finish to the day, walking west across the paddocks, watching the sky turn to sunset and darken. The stars began to twinkle, accompanied by the usual bird-calls at day's end.

We arrived back at the cars at 6:30pm. Our legs had been trudging along on autopilot for at least the previous hour. It had been a wonderful walk through wilderness not often visited, with some huge trees, a few small delicate but spectacular orchids and a grand waterfall. Thanks to Desley and Bill for your great company and to Bill for doing such a good job of navigating.
