# GENERAL MEETINGS

Meetings are held on the 3rd Monday of every month, being scheduled to commence at 7.30 pm (although they usually start about 15 minutes later). The location is currently in the basement of the Catholic Centre (near St Stephen's Cathedral) with entry via Charlotte Street. The door is usually manned up to about 8.00 pm. If you arrive after this, please ring the bell and wait for someone to let you in. Parking is NOT available on site and free parking can be difficult to find nearby. Parking is available close by at \$4.

VISITORS are always welcome.

# OUTINGS

- (a) Always read the Jilalan article to check the departure point, date and time.
- (b) Departure of walks is usually either from the rear of the Cathedral in Charlotte Street or at Sullivan & Nicolaides (134 Whitmore Street, Taringa enter via the upper driveway and drive down to the upper level of the carpark). Check Jilalan or phone the leader to be certain.
- (c) The Club will usually organise transport for each outing, but you must nominate in advance to the leader. Contacting to someone else may lead to your nomination becoming "lost". Nominations should preferably be made by the Monday prior to the activity (Wednesday at the latest) so that transport etc can be arranged. Note that nominations for some walks may close well in advance of this. Late nominations may not be accepted.
- (d) Walkers are responsible for their transport to and from the departure point.
- (e) Walks are rarely cancelled if they are, all nominees will be notified. Should you change your mind and decide not to come to a club event, please notify the leader as soon as possible.

# EMERGENCY OFFICER

If, within the hour prior to an outing's departure, you can't make it or you are running late, phone the number shown in the Jilalan for the Emergency Officer for that outing. If you have not returned from an outing by 9.00 pm, your family may ring the Emergency Officer — but please don't panic.

# EQUIPMENT HIRE

The Club has some tents and through-walk packs to hire to visitors and newer members. Borrowers are responsible for collecting and returning equipment, as well as making good any loss or damage over and above normal wear and tear. Hire rates - Packs \$10/weekend, Tents \$5.00 - Deposit of \$20 required.

# PERSONAL EQUIPMENT

The Association requires that certain minimal basic equipment should be carried by all walkers on all trips. This should comprise the following - a first aid kit, a torch, a parka/raincoat, hat, shirt, 15+ (or suitable value) sun screen and at least 2 litres of water. Leaders may require that walkers carry other equipment. Advice of this will be given in Jilalan and/or by the leader.

# Mt Tamborine Day Walk

This delightful pre-Christmas walk in the cool and scenic environment of Mt Tamborine will be the perfect way to begin the holiday period. Two walks will be undertaken.

The three kilometre morning walk will be down the western side of the plateau to Witches Falls and back. Declared in 1908, Witches Falls was Queensland's first national park. The track zig zags down the mountain side through open forest with banksia trees into rainforest with huge strangler figs. Good valley views can be enjoyed at the start and at the end of the walk.

The afternoon walk will be to Jenyn's Falls on the eastern side of the plateau. It is a 5.4 kilometre circuit through rainforest, transition forest dominated by brush box and occasional hoop pine and open eucalypt forest where grey gum, grey iron bark and drooping sheoak are common. Good views of the Gold Coast can be expected.

To enter into the spirit of the season please decorate your hat for Christmas. (Use tinsel, bells and/or other creative things.) There are prizes to be won!!!!

Please pack all gear in strong waterproof plastic bags, bring sunscreen, insect repellent, hat, and a long sleeve shirt and long cotton pants are also a good idea - it could be HOT.

PAST OUTINGS

GIRRAWEEN NATIONAL PARK BASE CAMP - 27-29 OCTOBER (LEADER: BARRY ELLERINGTON)

It is not often a weekend walk gets under way early but, due to excellent transport arrangements, eighteen walkers were on their way by five o'clock. The sky looked very cloudy with a great deal of lightning around the Granite Belt. It is a four hour trip to Girraween, with most of the walkers arriving around 9.30 pm.

After erecting tents, arranging comforts for the weekend and a quick cup of coffee around Paul's camping stove, we were driven into our beds by the rain. Showers continued through the night and a terrific thunderstorm at some early hour of the morning. Saturday dawned and we were blessed with the most perfect day, with clear blue skies and warm sunshine, birds singing in the trees. It felt good.

After breakfast we all decided to pay a visit to the Valley of the Winds and. as I had never actually seen this elusive gorge. I felt even better. The walk started from the day-use picnic area at the rear of Mount Norman. The tracks were fairly open and the forest and heathlands were still regrowing from the drought and the 1994 bushfires. Springtime flowers were in bloom. The honeydew colourful and glistening along the edges of the tracks.

Soon we hit the granite slabs and our first stop at a good vantage point to take photos of Mount Norman. Here we turned left and wound our way through the scrubby sections, the weathered dykes, and the boulders to make the ascent of Mallee Ridge. The views from the ridge are something one never forgets - West Rock, Middle Rock and South Bald Rock, and the granite monolith of Bald Rock itself all add to Girraween's sculptured boulder-strewn hills.

A short stop and on to the Valley. Matthew took over at this point and led us all along a more direct route he knew to the top of the gorge. The first view was as I had pictured in my mind — beautiful rainforest plants strewn across the floor with steep cliffs on either side. After morning tea we made the descent into the creek and to the entrance of the gorge from the bottom end. This is blocked by a huge boulder and the only way in is by crawling through a very narrow gap. One of our walkers having difficulty getting in there claimed the boulder must have moved since his last visit!

I had promised a visit and an ascent of Mount Norman so, after everyone had seen the Valley of the Winds, we all made our way to the top of Mallee Ridge and a rather late lunch. Making our way across the granite slabs we soon picked up the track system and made the steep climb to the granite tor of Mount Norman. For those who did not wish to make the climb, Paul took them on to the Eye of the Needle and to the Wombat and Corkscrew Caves. The rest of us made the climb to the summit and absorbed the magnificent view of all the park from this point. We regrouped at the Eye of the Needle and made our way down to the cars and back to camp. It had been a great day. The Girraween campsite as always was superb and the evening was spent around the campfire sharing our goodies and chatting of past times.

Sunday dawned and once more we were blessed with superb weather. Today we planned to climb the two pyramids and, for those who wished, Paul volunteered to lead a walk to the Underground River and the Aztec Temple.

We left camp at 8.00am and made our way along the track to the start of the rock slab and up the first pyramid. This is a steep but reasonably easy climb to the summit. Yes, the balancing rock is still there and it never ceases to amaze me how it can just sit there on its minute pedestal. The views from the summit are to the south and are always impressive. Clearly seen are Mt Norman, the Spinx, Turtle and Castle Rocks, Aztec Temple and Bald Rock. The Pyramids are a photographer's delight but only a cinemascope screen could display the true panorama before us.

We made our way down a short but not too difficult gully on the north side and into the saddle between the two pyramids. Half an hour of easy walking around the base of the second pyramid brought us to the only route up this massive chunk of rock. The climb is very difficult and requires a great deal of care. The gully is narrow and rock climbing experience is a must. We chimneyed up the first part of the narrow gully and, with the aid of the tape we had brought along, the remainder of the climb was made a little easier. The second part of the climb is even narrower still. We crawled, grunted and squeezed our way upwards and on to the first boulder (thank you Ray for pulling me out when I got stuck). I am not the only one to loose weight.

Now came the worst bit - the leap across the gully we had just squeezed through. The landing spot on the other side is not very level and some momentum is needed to overcome this slope but, with teamwork we soon had everyone across and the rock was conquered. The summit is much larger and flatter than the first pyramid and sadly, the steel box with its register is no longer there, but the views are equally as impressive.

As much care is required for the descent of this rock and teamwork once again came into play. I wished I had a recorder to tape, some of the comments made on this climb. They were very amusing.

With everyone down safely, we strolled through heath and bracken and down into the paddocks and back to basecamp. We departed at 2.00pm and, after a coffee stop at Stanthorpe it was back to suburbia.

I would like to give my grateful thanks to Matthew for his guidance to the Valley of the Winds, to Patricia for being my tail end Charlie, to the great group of walkers who came along and made this a most enjoyable weekend, and to all those who drove their cars - a great team.



The last stretch is a really nice walk so it was on to the Wishing Tree. Hopefully a few of those wishes will come true.

We passed through an area of tree ferns and over a short suspension bridge, a short detour to Mick's Tower which is 18 metres high. The tower was opened 5 August 1990 in honour of Mick O'Reilly. Some walkers did well and climbed to the top. We finished a leisurely walk early enough to pack up tents and have tea, coffee, cakes, etc before making our way home.

1 egg, beaten
40mL iced water
thin coloured icing



# Instructions:

1. Place flour and sugar into the bowl of food processor. Cut margarine into cubes and add to dry ingredients. Process until mixture resembles coarse breadcrumbs. Add vanilla, egg and water and process until mixture forms a ball around the blade. Wrap dough in plastic wrap and chill for 1 hour before using.

2. Cut small pieces of the dough and shape into letters, bells, baubles or other interesting shapes to hang on the Christmas tree. Place on a greased baking tray. Bake at 200C (400F) for 8 minutes or until golden.

3. Ice and decorate as desired. Use ribbon to attach biscuits to tree.
