Lately there's been much talk about a recession in our club with regards to people attending walks this year. To ascertain just how widespread this supposed slump is I have been examing the numbers for trip attendances for the last three years and also those figures available for this year.

These have been compared with the total possible attendance and expressed as a percentage. This year's figures cannot be taken as accurate, they should in fact be somewhat higher. This not withstanding, this years figures compare more than favorably with those of recent years.

Though this years figures are comparable with previous year's percentages they are disapointing in that they show that only a fraction of the club can be expected on any outing. Wherein lies this lack of spirit. Are there too few "hard" men to encourage others? Are the walks too hard? Are they too easy? At present, approximately 50% of the club members have been in the club two years or more and only about 15% less than 1 year. These should be providing the backbone of the club but this is not generally the case. Irrespective of whether the trip is easy or hard, the same people can be expected along.

So, what's to be done? As I see it, we must realize that only a small percentage of paid up members can be expected to support the club in an active manner. This is as it has always been and not much can be done by bitching your brain out. Some encouragement to less enthusiastic members may do some good but apart from that you will have to learn to live with it.
