GENERAL MEETINGS

Meetings are held on the 3rd Monday of every month, being scheduled to commence at 7.30 pm (although they usually start about 15 minutes later). The location is currently in the basement of the Catholic Centre (near St Stephen's Cathedral) with entry via Charlotte Street. The door is usually manned up to about 8.00 pm. If you arrive after this, please ring the bell and wait for someone to let you in. Parking is NOT available on site and free parking can be difficult to find nearby. Parking is available close by at \$4.

VISITORS are always welcome.

OUTINGS

- (a) Always read the Jilalan article to check the departure point, date and time.
- (b) Departure of walks is usually either from the rear of the Cathedral in Charlotte Street or at Sullivan & Nicolaides (134 Whitmore Street, Taringa - enter via the upper driveway and drive down to the upper level of the carpark). Check Jilalan or phone the leader to be certain.
- (c) The Club will usually organise transport for each outing, but you must nominate in advance to the leader. Contacting to someone else may lead to your nomination becoming "lost". Nominations should preferably be made by the Monday prior to the activity (Wednesday at the latest) so that transport etc can be arranged. Note that nominations for some walks may close well in advance of this. Late nominations may not be accepted.
- (d) Walkers are responsible for their transport to and from the departure point.
- (e) Walks are rarely cancelled - if they are, all nominees will be notified. Should you change your mind and decide not to come to a club event, please notify the leader as soon as possible.

EMERGENCY OFFICER

If, within the hour prior to an outing's departure, you can't make it or you are running late, phone the number shown in the Jilalan for the Emergency Officer for that outing. If you have not returned from an outing by 9.00 pm, your family may ring the Emergency Officer - but please don't panic.

EQUIPMENT HIRE

The Club has some tents and through-walk packs to hire to visitors and newer members. Borrowers are responsible for collecting and returning equipment, as well as making good any loss or damage over and above normal wear and tear. Hire rates - Packs \$10/weekend, Tents \$5.00 - Deposit of \$20 required.

PERSONAL EQUIPMENT

The Association requires that certain minimal basic equipment should be carried by all walkers on all trips. This should comprise the following - a first aid kit, a torch, a parka/raincoat, hat, shirt, 15+ (or suitable value) sun screen and at least 2 litres of water. Leaders may require that walkers carry other equipment. Advice of this will be given in Jilalan and/or by the leader.

BOOLOUMBA CREEK THROUGHWALK AND BASECAMP

This throughwalk is a pretty one in lovely light rainforest. You will be following Lobster Creek up to its headwaters. Can you guess why it is so named - yes, little freshwater lobsters are found in it. The party goes up this little creek, from its rocky/boulder stage with waterfalls, up past numerous side creeks to the "young" creek. There will be long slabs to go along, pools to pass, lush cool green rainforest to cut through. At the spot, you will climb out of the creek and go through the old logged area to the top of the ridge. Now for the descent to the bottom, for a difference through eucalypt forest. Just what you need at the end of the day, the walk back up. You camp in open eucalypt country, with ample firewood.

Next morning, it is a brisk walk down the trail to the causeway and into Booloumba Creek. This we follow, sometimes in but mostly along. The character of this waterway is different to that of the day before. Now the creek is not as "young" so it meanders a bit, but also has larger pools and some sandy parts. After 2 hours you will come to a surprise - the Breadknife. This is at the junction of two creeks and is a series of large, deep rock pools, each lower than the other just next to it. In the middle of the junction is the knife point of the breadknife, to be climbed by those who want. A short period will be spent here for the rock confident to scramble.

Now it is off along and atop of the Gorge. This is the interesting part. You do this for about an hour until it is again safe to enter the creek. A good hop across the top of our morning tea falls. Then a short bit more of scree slope, and finally down to the creek for the rest of the trip. Now rockhopping for hours.

A pretty trip, especially Lobster Creek with its many phases. And the Breadknife area is not to be missed. A good homely camp site with good wood. I class this trip for the newer throughwalkers, though not for those who are uncomfortable with heights, scree slopes, and rockhopping. It is not easy, certainly not flat, there is no graded track, and there are some waterfalls to negotiate - either by going

the direct route straight up or down, or contouring around. I will say "yes" or "no" to those who nominate.

PAST OUTINGS

UPPER REYNOLDS GORGE DAYWALK

December, 1995

The good rains of the past few weeks has provided ideal opportunities for creek walks, which have been limited in recent years. To take advantage of this, a walk was quickly organised for the upper reaches of Reynold's Creek, which flows eastwards from the southern Main Range. Its catchment is the crags of Mt Roberts, Lizard Point, Mt Bell and Mt Bangalore.

It was a tight fit in the new Pajero with Justin, John B., Mike Wood, Mark Daly and myself arriving at 7.30 am. We struck out for the Bell - Bangalore saddle, by following an old track beside a creek. Dominant trees in the eucalypt forest were iron bark, stringybark and tallowwood. After a steep spur and some contouring, we reached the saddle, which provided a view of the day's walk. We descended a small spur into a dry gully. This led to the creek.

This section of the creek was lined by lantana, so we didn't proceed further upstream. Several large red cedars and brush box dominated the area. We walked downstream to the start of the gorge. The water level was sufficient considering the creek's size. After smoko the fun began. We waded, jumped, swam and slipped our way for about a kilometre, with rock walls towering over us. A couple of rock falls made it a little awkward. Some caution was necessary as the rock pools were only about a few feet deep.

At the end of the gorge we had lunch and cuppa, where a tributary joined the creek. Another small gorge is located here, which ends in a 3 metre deep pool (absolutely marvellous). This gorge will have to be explored another time, as it looks promising.

The long slog up Mt Bangalore followed. Droppings from wallaroos was present everywhere. From the summit's rocky pavement, we enjoyed a final glimpse of the Main Range to Mt Castle. The range from Mt Roberts to Lizard Point was close enough to touch (several flame trees could be seen). We descended via a steep spur down to where the vehicle was parked. A relaxing and challenging day with plenty of cloud cover. With the prospect of further rain, more creek walks are sure to follow this summer.

On the old Canungra line.

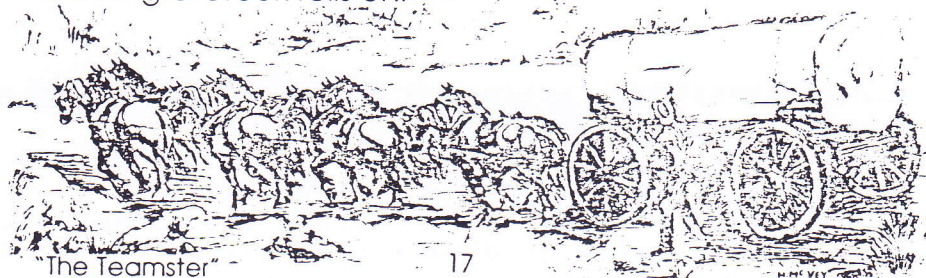
Down the green Canungra Valley,

LILONG DOWN THE OBI OBI January 1996

Some "walks" can only be done when the timing is right. Recent heavy rain in SE QLD as a result of the recent cyclone not only helped farmers but it filled some dams. In particular Baroon Pocket Dam near Maleny. Phil had learnt from our man at the dam that there was four to six inches of water flowing over the spillway - the first time since last summer.

A team was organised on the Saturday, which included Anthony D., Mike W. and Nick, a mate of Phils. Our plan was to float from the dam wall to the OBI OBI bridge near Kenilworth, about 10 kms. Sunday's weather was a beauty, as we completed our one hour car shuffle. We donned our wet weather clothing, inflated lilos and jumped in.

The water was pleasantly cool, as we negotiated our first rapids. A number of techniques were attempted so as to remain afloat. Some rapids we choose to walk around. The creek dropped sharply as we neared the Narrows. After an hour or so, we had floated to the Narrow's large pool. At this point in the gorge a tributary flows over a waterfall, which provided a refreshing shower. The eastern cliffs in the National Park towered over us and on the west was the heavily timbered State Forest. Remnant rainforest was impressive with large bunya pine, figs and beech, festooned with epiphytes.

The day was spent on our backs as we continued in a northerly direction. The pools became longer, which required some paddling to cross. Bird life was more often heard than seen, but we did observe kingfishers and a flying scrub turkey.

At 3.30pm we reached Skene Creek, which is where we usually leave and walk to Kondalilla Falls. It was to be another 2 hours before the bridge came into view. The only mishap was a hole in Nick's lilo. Fortunately a spare was carried. We were totally impregnated with water, a little tired and sore as we climbed out of the creek.

Floating down the Obi Obi is one of those experiences that is a must. Keep an eye on the dam levels.

SCORE YOUR BUSHWALKING TRIPS

For those who asked for it, its back!

When the following article was printed in Binna Burra magazine and the Jilalan in 1985, Pat topped the score and, in Ross Buchanan's assessment, should have been a professional bushwalker. So here's your chance to see how you rate.

"Score your Bushwalking Trips

Ross Buchanan

South-east Queensland provides a huge array of bushwalking opportunities. In recent years I've become even more aware of this because, despite being a regular bushwalker since 1970, I've found there are still a large number of places I have not visited. Eventually, in an effort to reduce the number of "unvisited" places, I was prompted into compiling a list of the hundred most classic bushwalks in south-east Queensland. The result was surprising, both in terms of the number of places I've visited and the number I've missed. You will probably find it rather surprising also.

However, firstly some explanation. To provide a good test of the amount of one's bushwalking activity in the region, it has been necessary to list not only classic peaks and bushwalking localities, but also many bushwalking routes. One hundred was an appropriate number, but note that eligibility for the list is not guaranteed simply by how well known a place is. The list concentrates on places which have "classic" bushwalking appeal, are away from graded tracks, and require at least a moderate effort to achieve. Nevertheless amongst the selection you will find a vast range of difficulty, from the moderately easy to the extremely hard. This probably adds interest to the system, for in the final rating all score the same - 1 point.

I should also explain that the final selection is unavoidably subjective. Probably eighty of the hundred items on the list would be undisputed, but I'm sure there would be many opinions on about twenty or so inclusions. These generally are broadly scattered and provide some representation of more minor or less classic features or areas.

Count up the number of routes you have completed or peaks/localities you have achieved. This is your score in points or as a percentage. To provide some additional interest, I have adapted Moh's scale of geological (rock) hardness to enable you to measure your "hardness" as a bushwalker:

0-10	Talc (doesn't rate)
11-20	Gypsum (you're still very soft)
21-30	Calcite (fair)
31-40	Fluorite (you've been regularly walking for some years)
41-50	Apatite (good)
51-60	Orthoclase (very good)
61-70	Quartz (do you spend any time at home?)
71-80	Topaz (excellent)
81-90	Corundum (why don't you become a professional bushwalker?)
91-100	Diamond (outstanding)

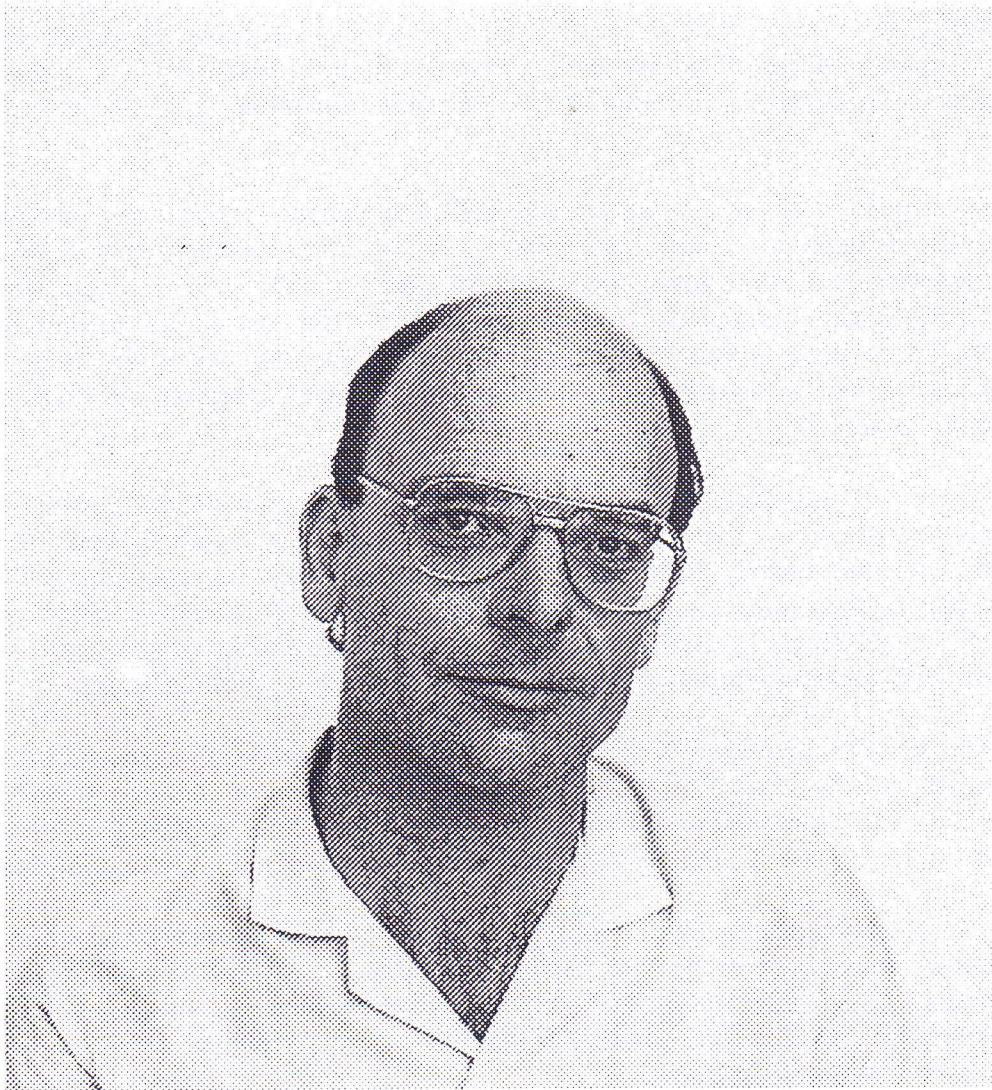
