

EMERGENCY OFFICER

If, within the hour prior to an outings' departure, you can't make it or you are running late, phone the number shown in the "Jilalan" for the Emergency Officer for that outing. If you have not returned from an outing by 9.00 p.m. your family may ring the Emergency Officer - but please don't panic.

EQUIPMENT HIRE

The Club has some tents and through-walk packs to hire to visitors and newer members. Borrowers are responsible for collecting and returning equipment, as well as making good any loss or damage over and above normal wear and tear. Hire rates - Packs \$10/weekend, Tents \$5.00 - Deposit of \$20 required.

PERSONAL EQUIPMENT

The Association requires that certain minimal basic equipment should be carried by all walkers on all trips. This should comprise the following - a first aid kit, a torch, a parka/raincoat, hat, shirt, 15 + (or suitable value), sun screen and at least 2 litres of water. Leaders may require that walkers carry other equipment. Advice of this will be given in "Jilalan" and/or by the leader.

GENERAL MEETINGS

Meetings are held on the 3rd Monday of every month, being scheduled to commence at 7.30 p.m (although they usually start about 15 minutes later). The location is currently in the basement of the Catholic Centre (near St Stephen's Cathedral) with entry via Charlotte Street. The door is usually staffed up to about 8.00 p.m. If you arrive after this time, please ring the bell and wait for someone to let you in. Parking is NOT available on site and free parking can be difficult to find nearby. Parking is available close by at \$4.00.

VISITORS are always welcome.

OUTINGS

- (a) Always read the Jilalan article to check the departure point, date and time.
- (b) Departure of walks is usually either from the rear of the Cathedral in Charlotte Street or at Sullivan & Nicolaides (134 Whitmore Street, Taringa enter via the upper driveway and drive down to the upper level of the carpark). Check "Jilalan" or phone the leader to be certain.
- (c) The Club will usually organise transport for each outing, but you must nominate in advance to the leader. Contacting someone else may lead to your nomination becoming "lost". Nominations should preferably be made by the Monday prior to the activity (Wednesday at the latest) so that transport etc. can be arranged. Note that nominations for some walks may close well in advance of this. Late nominations may not be accepted.
- (d) Walkers are responsible for their transport to and from the departure point.
- (e) Walks are rarely cancelled if they are, all nominees will be notified. Should you change your mind and decide not to come to a club event, please notify the leader as soon as possible.

COMING WALKS

MT GREVILLE (DAY WALK)

Mt Greville is located on the left hand side of the Cunningham Highway just past Aratula. From that direction, it looks like a wallaby feeding with its head close to the ground and its ears erect. It is a very picturesque mountain with dramatic cliffs on the North-East face and several beautiful gorges. The vegetation changes remarkably from open heath and eucalypt forest on the ridges to palm trees and rainforest in the gorges.

After a short stop at Aratula, we will drive towards the mountain from the Spicer's Gap turnoff, passing beneath the North-East cliffs (great photo opportunity) and around to its South-East side. We will then walk up the South-East ridge to the top. The two main gorges are on either side of this ridge - Palm Gorge on the left, and on the right the more spectacular Waterfall Gorge. We will be passing close to the edge of this gorge at a number of spots. There are good views on the way up and just past the top. After lunch at the top, we will descend via Palm Gorge, which is a lovely cool gorge with sides as close as 4 metres apart and about 70 metres high.

This is not a difficult walk, but like all mountain walks, it has a fair climb. Since it is short (all up maybe 6 km), we can take our time in the ascent, so this is a good walk for those who would like to extend themselves from graded tracks. Its scenic value makes it a very rewarding walk for the effort involved.

(For comparison of amount <u>climbed</u> on recent walks: Knapps Pk 435 m, Mt Alexander 455 m, Mt Greville 595 m, Mt Ernest 635 m, Minnages Mtn 655 m, Mt Barney 1125 m).

Christmas Creek is surrounded by many spectacular peaks and mountains - rugged Mt Widgee to the north and the western ridge of Point Lookout to the south. Buchanan's Forte is one of the peaks situated to the north east of the camping ground at the Stinson Memorial Park. It can be approached from two different ways - from the Christmas Creek Valley or the Albert River Valley. However, Chistmas Creek is a very pretty area to visit not only for its natural attractions, or the history of the Stinson Crash that the area is famed for, but for the peace and tranquillity this beautiful valley has to offer. It is because of this that I have decided to make the ascent from this point.

Buchanan's is a spectacular bluff abounded by sheer cliffs on the eastern side. It is not a difficult climb - it is steep but a straight forward ascent. The walk will take us up the western ridge. This will offer us some good views of the national park, of the creek and the mountains to the west. From the summit, we will be able to absorb views to Lost World, Mt Widgee, Mt Westray and to Neglected Mountain.

With the weather now cooling down, this will be a very rewarding walk. Don't miss out on a great day.

Boonoo Boonoo 25-28 January 1996 (Barry Ellerington)

The Australia Day weekend is usually either wet or very hot and this year was no exception. Ten walkers took the opportunity to escape the summer heat of the city and visit the Granite region of Boonoo Boonoo and Bald Rock National Park. After careful thought, I decided to camp at the Bald Rock camping ground because of its water supply and the ample toilet facilities. This turned out to be the wise choice as Boonoo Boonoo camp site was chokkers full.

Friday dawned as one of those days that makes you feel good to be alive. The sun was warm and we had an abundance of birds around us that joined us for breakfast with one Kookaburra performing his majestic dive into my frying pan, nicking off with my bacon - given five more minutes I would have cooked it for him! After breakfast, we packed and made the 200 km drive to Boonoo Boonoo Falls. The Falls still had a great deal of water going over them which made it a photographers delight. There is nothing like a waterfall to bring out nature's settings. The climb down the side of the Falls is a mixture of track and rock scrambling. The tracks themselves are in ill repair and some care was needed negotiating them. The last 50 metres were very steep but took us through some majestic rainforest and brought us down into this beautiful side creek with little waterfalls and cool clear water flowing into the main river system. It was here that our rock hopping trip started down the river to Rocky Point. The gorge was by now starting to warm up - it was a good time for a swim. The river has many rock slabs, pools, rapids, sandy beaches and waterfalls - one of which was too good to miss! We spent over an hour swimming here - it was a good morning tea stop. Lunch was had at a second swimming hole and by now the heat was unbearable. Although a little short of our destination, we made this our turnaround point and headed back to the camp site.

The Saturday walk was to be to South Bald Rock. The day was much cooler than the previous one and this made the 7 km walk very pleasant. The track to South Bald is easy going and follows the border fence all the way. The half-way point is marked by a large outcrop of granite boulders and slabs, and is named Mini Bald Rock. This turned out to be a great vantage point and from here we had the most marvellous views to the Pyramids, Mt Norman, Middle and West Rocks, Bald Rock and our destination. South Bald Rock has three large granite domes. Between these are some spectacular rainforest gorges and lots of underground caverns and nooks and crannies to explore. The views from the summit are excellent. After a lazy lunch, the more adventurous explored the underground nooks and crannies before exploring the east side of the rock in search of further

caverns. We never did find these and left them for another day.

Bald Rock is the main feature of the National Park. It is a magnificent dome of granite rising some 200 metres above the bushland. From our campsite, it is a short easy walk to the base of the rock and a 2.4 km climb to the summit. This gave us a very pleasant walk for Sunday morning. The ascent is very rewarding with extensive views over granite-dotted landscape and as far as the Tweed Range with the Barney Ballow Ranges to the east.

A few of us had never seen a lyrebird in the wild before. During the climb, we were very lucky to stumble across a pair of these magnificent birds in a small gully. The male was obviously in the mating mood with the female playing hard to get. The chase was on through the scrub and went on for a considerable time! They were still going strong on our decent - this chap was not going to give up. Whatever he had for breakfast was going to have to last him a long time.

Thanks to all my walkers who came along and made this Australia Day weekend a very pleasant one. Thank you to all the drivers and to Ed and Con for their kind assistance in the pre-outing.

Canoe Trip, Noosa River 20-21 January 1996 (June Greenaway)

We all had an early start, meeting at Burpengary Station at 7.00 a.m. on Saturday. Six cars and twenty-one canoeists drove another 75 minutes to Elanda Point, where we hired our canoes. Unfortunately, one car load came a little late and I got a blast about that! Oh, the joys of being a leader ... aggh!

After dropping our gear off near the lake, parking cars, doing the slip slop slap routine and loading up the canoes, we paddled off across Lake Cootharaba about an hour later. Iain had a kayak and seemed to skim across the water so easily, while the rest of us were settling in to the paddling. Everyone did really well! The Lake was a lot browner than I had remembered it, probably due to the heavy rains. We had a well earned rest at Kinaba Visitor Centre at the north-west corner of the Lake. Here, we had morning tea, swims and a boardwalk through the mangroves. Then it was off again, through the channel to join the Noosa River and being careful not to go up Kin Kin Creek. Who managed to find the only pole standing up in the river and hit it smack in the middle? We seemed to fly up the River and arrived at Harry's Camping area just after midday. It was a major operation squashing ten canoes and one kayak into such a small space and it looked really good the way they were all lined up. After setting up camp, we all did our own thing - canoeing, swimming and relaxing. It was a hot day, so the swim was a YES for everyone - nearly everyone encountered an exuberant nude swimmer! Luckily the river was a dark brown . Also, it was lucky there was drinking water at Harry's Hut as no one fancied the river water.

PRIVATE WALKS

Northbrook Creek 26 January 1996 (John Carter)

Unable to get away for the long weekend, Justin, Mark and myself decided to have a look at the Northbrook Creek Valley and enjoy the pleasures of the gorge. Leaving early, we appreciated the views from Northbrook Lookout at 8.00 a.m. It was a clear, sunny morning. Then we went down the winding road to the apiary site (near knoll 296), which is the quick way into the gorge.

Dropping into the creek near a large blue quandong tree, we soon reached a small gorge. After swimming through, we rockhopped upstream to where a small gully joined the creek on the right - we decided to follow it. The sweat flowed freely as we climbed 250 metres to a saddle through a forest understorey regenerating after a recent wildfire. Heading north to rocky knoll 463, we had a superb view of the entire valley from the Summit to Wivenhoe Dam and overlooking the main gorge. This spur, by the way, meanders southwards to Mt Northbrook. A large southerly tributary flows into the creek, so we decided to drop into it. This led us through a moderate patch of lantana. The creek was flowing well and an exploratory walk upstream was required. Attractive rainforest aligned the creek. Figs, quandong, piccabeen palms and even a large red cedar was spotted. We also saw fruit pigeons, an emerald dove and a wompoo pigeon. We followed the creek downstream to the main stream. It was only a few hundred metres to the gorge. Time for a swim, lunch and a brew! It was most pleasant in the cool shadows of the gorge walls. There are four pools to swim through. We continued downstream to the minor gorge. A number of trees had fallen into the creek as a result of the fire. Retracing our steps it wasn't long before we had returned to our car. This was followed by a heavy downpour.

A relaxing walk in a beautiful creek, which is close to Brisbane. It was well worth the effort!
