JILALAN

Articles for "Jilalan" should be posted to Cecilia Doherty 2/32 Stanley Terrace, East Brisbane. Please note there are different deadlines for submitting articles on paper and on disk as shown in the monthly calendar. The Editor is currently using MS WORD 6.0 but can convert from most programs. Please submit a hard copy of the article just in case there are problems with your disk.

GENERAL MEETINGS

Meetings are held on the 3rd Monday of every month, at 7.30 p.m (although they usually start about 15 minutes later). The location is currently not determined. Contact the President for details. **VISITORS are always welcome**.

OUTINGS

- (a) Always read the Jilalan article to check the departure point, date and time.
- (b) Departure of walks is usually either from the rear of the Cathedral in Charlotte Street or at Sullivan & Nicolaides (134 Whitmore Street, Taringa enter via the upper driveway and drive down to the upper level of the carpark). Check "Jilalan" or phone the leader to be certain.
- (c) The Club will usually organise transport for each outing, but you must nominate in advance to the leader. Contacting someone else may lead to your nomination becoming "lost". Nominations should preferably be made by the Monday prior to the activity (Wednesday at the latest) so that transport etc. can be arranged. Note that nominations for some walks may close well in advance of this. Late nominations may not be accepted.
- (d) Walkers are responsible for their transport to and from the departure point.
- (e) Walks are rarely cancelled if they are, all nominees will be notified. Should you change your mind and decide not to come to a club event, please notify the leader as soon as possible.

EMERGENCY OFFICER

If, within the hour prior to an outings' departure, you can't make it or you are running late, phone the number shown in the "Jilalan" for the Emergency Officer for that outing. If you have not returned from an outing by 9.00 p.m. your family may ring the Emergency Officer - but please don't panic.

EQUIPMENT HIRE

The Club has some tents and through-walk packs to hire to visitors and newer members. Borrowers are responsible for collecting and returning equipment, as well as making good any loss or damage over and above normal wear and tear. Hire rates - Packs \$10/weekend, Tents \$5.00 - Deposit of \$20 required.

PERSONAL EQUIPMENT

The Association requires that certain minimal basic equipment should be carried by all walkers on all trips. This should comprise the following - a first aid kit, a torch, a parka/raincoat, hat, shirt, 15+ (or suitable value), sun screen and at least 2 litres of water. Leaders may require that walkers carry other equipment. Advice of this will be given in "Jilalan" and/or by the leader.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

All members are most welcome to observe the next meeting of the Management Committee. The dates of the Committee meetings have also been listed in Jilalan. You are very welcome to attend the meeting but <u>please contact the President beforehand</u>. This means you can be advised of any change of date/venue. If you feel strongly about an issue, bring it along to the Committee Meeting and we'll put it on the agenda. The dates of future Committee meetings have also been listed in Jilalan.

Wilson's Peak marks the junction of the McPherson Range and the Great Divide. We will take the north ridge to the top. The forest is attractive and good views are obtained on the open lower ridge sections, however, disappointingly the top provides few views. The ridge up is steep but not difficult with a little rock scrambling required on the final bit to the top. Water will need to be carried. A suitable walk for Easter Monday when most roads in and out of Brisbane will be extremely busy.

Have you ever stood on the beach at Woorim and gazed to the north wondering what wild places lie over the horizon? Stop wondering and find out for yourself as we venture on a circumnavigation of Bribie Island. About one third of Bribie is protected by Pumicestone National Park and is renowned for its bird life. There are believed to still be emus on the Island as well as the brush-tailed phascogale which is extinct on the mainland. There has also been a rumour around for a few decades about estuarine crocodile in Pumicestone Passage, you never know! At this time of year the Banksias are in flower and these grow well on Bribie, particularly the broad leafed, red honeysuckle, dwarf and coastal banksias.

Bribie is the perfect place for throughwalkers who don't like hills - I was unable to find a point on the topographic maps above 10 metres. If you're not crash hot at rock hopping don't worry, any stone on Bribie is very lost. The intention at his stage is to leave from White Patch and head north following the western coastline avoiding the pine plantation and the 15 kilometre swamp that runs through the centre of the Island. We will camp somewhere on the northern end of the Island and those of you desperate for civilisation can swim over to Caloundra if you so desire. Sunday we will head south along the surf beach checking out the three lagoons and possibly some World War II bunkers.

I'm not sure about the availability of water yet - I'll let you know after the pre outing but we may be required to carry all of our water. Gaiters will be highly desirable and suncream as we will be exposed. Hope to get your nomination at the meeting.

PAST WALKS

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Larapinta Falls 15 February 1997 by Ann Tracey

This was as a result of the 60 mm of rain which had fallen in the area the previous night.

After three water crossings we finally reached the track into Westrays Grave which was not badly affected by the rain, but fairly well inhabited by leeches. At the grave, excerpts from Bernard O'Reilly's "Green Mountains" were read, as a tribute to the efforts of Jim Westray to reach assistance.

Seven of the group decided not to proceed farther upstream, so John Carter, assisted by Justin Tobin, was asked to lead the group of nine to the Falls. With the higher water level, the 1 hr rock hop soon turned into a 1.5 hour wade, but the increased volume of water added to the spectacular sight of the Falls tumbling over the cliff.

The smaller group slowly made their way back downstream enjoying several swims along the way, with the result that we had not long to wait for the arrival of the second group back at the cars at 4.30 p.m.

As usual, the happy bantering among the group made the day very enjoyable, in spite of the overcast and sometimes rainy conditions. Thank you all very much for your company.

P.S. The leader took a small group from National Parks Association into the Falls the next day. The leeches had all but disappeared and seemed to have been replaced by blue crays everywhere!
