A RED BLAZE UPON A TREE

Once, not long ago, I walked through valleys green with myriad forms of life and movement; bright, rustling leaves and scampering little birds feeding, fighting, calling amid the sun beams. I stopped to look and listen, to capture some small part of the varied, moving life about me .. so wonderful.

Upon a tree beside me, a metal arrow painted red pointing away from the track so well-defined; pointing up out of the valleys so full of life; pointing to a rugged, windswept slope bare of any life save stunted grass and scrub and blackboys' spines. What fool, thought I, would risk his neck here with the track so clear below where birds build nests and feather them, where all is safe, familiar and music fills the air. Yet someone has gone before me, someone calls me on, for that red blaze appears at every turn.

Night on a ledge with black basalt behind and black void before; Night of wind and cold wet penetrating to the bone Night one thinks will never end; Night filled with fear and doubt; Night one learns to stand along; Night one learns to stand along; Night that must precede the day as surely as winter-spring, as birth-breath, as death-life.
