THROUGHWALK/BASE CAMP

Friday night will see base campers and throughwalkers camping at Rainbow beach. When the Saturday sun peeps over the horizon it will herald the day to start throughwalking. The throughwalkers will walk along the beach for approx. 1 mile so that some of the spectacular coloured sand cliffs can be seen. When viewing is complete the throughwalkers will shoot up into scunge and then break onto four wheel drive tracks, whence all walking shall proceed to follow these tracks. This track will then come out south of Double Island Point at Laguna Bay. After offloading packs, it will then be up to the Light House at Double Island Point to have a chat and maybe tea and biscuits depending how presentable the throughwalkers are. From the lighthouse a move will be made to the mouth of Freshwater Creek, where camp will be set up.

Water is plentiful on this trip so 2gal at the most is necessary. On Sunday the party will then walk up to Freshwater Lake and then up to Poona Lake, a lake much similiar to Wabby Lake on Frazer Island, except wider and set in very light rain forest with a beautiful white sand beach. Brian McMahon will be leading this trip so morale will be high, the air rich in mirth with his jokes and songs.

The basecampers will be having a leisurely weekend because it is planned to walk along the beach, in the footsteps more or less of last years trip, and finally ending up at Poona Lake to have lunch with the throughwalkers. Mt. Mitchell forms the southern head of Cunninghams gap which lies 70miles S.W. of Brisbane. On the southern side of the road a graded track 4miles in length ascends the northern slopes, round the West Peak of Mitchell (3792') across the sadle to the top of East Peak (828'). The track to the top is in open forest, except for the section around the West Peak, as this is a night walk and a full moon. is on the promise, it promises to be an excellent walk with no worry of the heat getting to you.

.MT. GIPPS-TWEED PINNACLE

THROUGHWALK/BASE CAMP

This unusual trip will have its beginnings in the South Brisbane Interstate Goods yards. Transport will be dependent on the vagaries of the N.S.W. transport Dept. but don't be alarmed. We will reach the Border Loop station! From this hole we will emerge to climb Ma. Gipps before making camp at the Bird Cage. There is a tank here so water for this part of the journey need not be carried. Next morning the party will follow the Border fence to about the trig. point. This section is easy walking through first open savannah, with tremendous views to the west, then through dense rainforest.

Then it's into the rainforest for another night then off to the Pinnacle. The going should be easy along wide roads through the forest to reach the Pinnacle by Sunday night. The views of the Twood Valley and the cliffs on either side have to be see to be believed. Next morning the descent from the Pinnacle starts. Following a wallaby trail, the trip down should only take about 1½ hours. Then its out to the base-camp.

In all, an arduous trip, but well worth it as it allows you to see both sides of the range in one go. A really good trip to get the walking season into full gear.

S FETY-AND TRAINING, REPORT

The safety and training weekend was held at the club hut on picture sque Barney creek. The weekend got away to a good start on Saturday with map reading, first aid theory, knots and ropes, abseiling and prussiking theory. Sunday arose to practical first aid , taught by our recently graduated instructors who all have obtained their first aid certificates. This was followed by a practice ab œil and prussiking. After cleaning up the Hut the intropid band sct off home and made it to the Cathedral for Mass.

OUTINGS IN RETROSPECT BORDER LOOP - MT. GLENNIE

Departure was from North Quay as per usual, that is, much later than planned. The throughwalkers arrived at Border Loop tick gate after having delivered the basecampers at their proposed camp site. Notwithstanding the time, it being just past midnight, a fire was lit and the billy boiled in the true Pater Herzog style. A fourth car arrived just in time for a cuppa and to bring the complement of walkers up to 6 including a lone female.

All walkers were ship-shape and ready by 8 o'clock next morning and we set out along the rabbit fence with pessimistic predictions of the leader getting lost as soon as the fence ran out, put forward by the rabble who followed behind. Lunch was spent adjacent to a pleasant but unnamed waterfall. The general walking was pleasant and through dry rainforest and savannah. Snakes were plentiful. Saturday night campsite was reached at a reasonable time of 4 o'clock with sufficient time to observe the fantastic views of Knapp's Peak (yes, you heard it -Knapp's Peak!), Maroon and of course, the beautiful sunset over Mt. Barney. Tents were pitched and a fire was lit, which marked the beginning of a sumptuous feast lasting from approx. 6 o'clock till it finished with Russ Nelson's raspberry jelly at nine. Consequently, the departure was somewhat delayed, and we didn't start walking till ten o'clock which was rather slack. Sunday's walking was mostly in rainforest and a visit was paid to a rabbit hut when we detoured around Mt. Tanna. When a section of savannah was reached on Sunday afternoon, Mt. Lindsay was revealed in its full splendour. From this vantage point we dropped down to the basecampers. The throughwalker's cars were retrieved and from there we had a rally to get to Mass in Woodenbong. On Monday morning we departed for Brisbane.

BORDER LOOP - MT. GLENNIE (cont)

Base-camp: After a very relaxed breakfast, we set off walking two miles along the Lindsay Highway in the direction of Woodenbong, then left the highway and struck up a road leading to a farm. After following the road for a quarter mile, the party dropped into very thick scunge. Exiting from the scunge the party broke up to the cliff line. Following this line, the walkers climbed higher and higher, ever aware of the drop on the right. After a brief stop two members broke through to the top with one final effort. From the top rewarding views of Lindsay, Ernest, Barney, Knapps Peak and the main range lay in panoramic splendour before these people. A quick lunch on top and it was back down to pick up the others and home via a cleared path through the bush to once again the highway. Sunday saw the party getting off to a good start, and after stepping it out along the road, a road was taken to the left. This road should have led to the rabbit hut near the base of Mt. Glennie, but it did not. After whizzing up to the Lindsay House for information and being put on the right track so to speak, the again diminished party set off. Being late and as it was intended to meet the throughwalkers for lunch, the base of Glennie was skirted until the proposed lunch spot was reached and the basecampers had lunch. After deducing that the throughwalkers got away to a late start, home was struck out for. The throughwalkers arrived at the base camp about 1/2 hours after the basecampers got back. The cars were collected and we set off for Mass. Monday saw everyone going home.

BUNYIP

A monster of aboriginal mythology, the bunyip was the subject of traditional beliefs and stories in different parts of Australia. Its name varied according to tribal nomenclature, but its appearance and habits were cosentially the same in many eastern regions of the continent. In general it lived in the depths of Lagoons and water-holes, emerging on moonlight nights to capture and devour any luckless human prey that came within its reach. It has a particular fondness for aboriginal women.

Long before the white man came, the natives believed in the existence of some dark creature of monstrous size that lived in the swamp, lagoons and billabongs of their tribal lands. Their descriptions of it varied, but they were all in agreement in describing its shining baleful eyes, and its bellowing voice. It had a huge body, either covered with fur or feathers and where its legs should have been there were flippers that thrashed the water when it was angry. It devoured human beings, coming upon them in silence and when least expected. The blacks I questioned about the bunyip always added, with some satisfaction, that it favoured women. My own experience with bushmen and their tales suggests that bunyips are usually seen in swamps near bush shanties. They are never seen by men going to shanties, only by men on their way home.....
