GENERAL MEETINGS

Meetings are held on the 3rd Monday of every month, at 7:30pm. The location is St Brigid's Parish Hall, Musgrave Rd, **RED HILL. VISITORS are always welcome.**

OUTINGS

- Always read the Jilalan article to check the departure point, date and time. (a)
- Departure of walks is usually either from the Old Windmill on Wickham Tce or at Sullivan & Nicolaides (134 (b) Whitmore Street, Taringa - enter via the upper driveway and drive down to the upper level of the carpark). Check "Jilalan" or phone the leader to be certain.
- The club will usually organise transport for each outing, but you must nominate in advance to the leader. Contacting (c) someone else may lead to your nomination becoming "lost". Nominations should preferably be made by the Monday prior to the activity (Wednesday at the latest) so that transport etc. can be arranged. Note that nominations for some walks may close well in advance of this. Late nominations may not be accepted.
- Walkers are responsible for their own transport to and from the departure point. (d)
- Walks are rarely cancelled if they are, all nominees will be notified. Should you change your mind and decide not (e) to come to a club event, please notify the leader as soon as possible.

EMERGENCY OFFICER

If, within the hour prior to an outing's departure, you can't make it or you are running late, phone the number shown in the Jilalan for the Emergency Officer for that outing. If you have not returned from an outing by 9:00pm your family may ring the Emergency Officer - but please don't panic.

EQUIPMENT HIRE

The Club has some tents and through-walk packs to hire to visitors and newer members. Borrowers are responsible for collecting and returning equipment, as well as making good any loss or damage over and above normal wear and tear. Hire rates - Packs \$10/weekend, Tents \$5:00 - Deposit of \$20:00 required.

PERSONAL EQUIPMENT

The Association requires that all walkers on all trips should carry certain minimal basic equipment. This should comprise the following - a first aid kit, a torch, a parka/raincoat, hat, shirt 30+ sunscreen and at least 2 litres of water. Leaders may require that walkers carry other equipment. Advice of this will be given in Jilalan and/or by the leader.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

All members are most welcome to attend a meeting of the Management Committee, but please contact the President beforehand. This means you can be advised of any change of date/venue. If you feel strongly about an issue, bring it along to the Committee Meeting and we'll put it on the agenda.

Have you ever thought how great it would be to walk the McPherson Range on a track with views all day?? This is the walk you've been looking for. We will be using a mini-bus for transport on this walk; it makes the day a lot of fun travelling together. We start the walk at the Boarder Gate between NSW & QLD, below the Cougals and follow the boarder fence all the way down to Coolangatta. This mighty fence has been in place for 200 years and is history and pioneering at its best. It is a down hill journey for most of the day with some steep climbs that are short-lived and crowned with endless views. We pass through forest, farmland, banana plantations, avocado and citrus trees amongst the rolling hills of this boarder country. You can even buy bags of bananas at a roadside stall for morning tea. A variety of native birds will be following our progress including the whip bird, kookaburras and many more, along with curious cattle and Pats horse who will be waiting for another muslin bar. Morning tea will be just past the old Strawberry Farm sitting up on top of the Range looking out over the coastline, from Tweed Heads all the way up to Surfers Paradise. There are a number of lookouts along the way and as we descend a few unfortunate signs of progress as the dreaded developers have made their way right up to the fence line. Quinzeh Rocks Wildflower Daywalk Sunday 20th August 2000

Quinzeh Rocks is the name of a rocky outcrop just south-east of Logan village. I have visited the area numerous times with the Queensland Orienteering Association and with the Society for Growing Australian Plants. It is from the Queensland Orienteers map 'Quinzeh on the Rocks' that I got the name for this walk.

The plan to get there, is to drive 12 kilometres south of Logan Village on the Waterford – Tamborine Village Road and then turn left into Plunkett Road and then turn left into Steele Road then drive for 4 kilometres back up to the ridge where we will start the walk.

The terrain is mostly undulating hills with a few ridges and a number of rocky outcrops and boulders. The flora is mostly open eucalyptus forest with lovely patches of heathland. The distance we will travel is short but convoluted as the idea is to see as many wildflowers as possible.

Also note, this is going to be an off track walk so we get to see the interesting pockets of wildflowers. So it may be advantageous to wear long pants and bring garden gloves. At the risk of sparking some controversy I would suggest that this trip could truly be called a 'bushwalk' as it is a leisurely walk through the bush rather then a hike along a graded track or a mountain climb that many of the club's trips entail.

The idea of doing this trip is to take the time to learn to see and how to appreciate the many hidden wildflowers of the Australian bush.

Every time I have been there I have been impressed by the proliferation of weird and wonderful plant life. My favourite is the small heart shaped leaves of the Pultanea cunninghamii. This plant is featured on the front cover of the local bible of botany, The Flora of South East Queensland by Stanley & Ross. The weirdest plant I found was the very scratchy Melichrus adpressus. A small shrub with very pointy leaves. This ridge is also the home of the Plunkett Mallee, the Eucalyptus curtisii. This tree was a very popular nursery tree in the 1980's.

Quinzeh Rocks also has a few outcrops that will provide a nice spot to have lunch and also a chance to enjoy the views of the surrounding scenic rim.

For those few interested in map references Quinzeh Rock is on the Wolfdene 1:25,000 topographic map (9542-31) at grid reference 137240.

If you would like to join me please nominate early as I will have to limit the numbers on the trip to just 8 as it would become pointless trying to show the wildflowers to a group larger then this.

Extract from the Silver Jubilee (1957-82) Booklet.

"On Saturday afternoon, 13 May 1961, a brass plague commemorating the mass said by Fr Hayes on Mt Barney on Exhibition Wednesday of the previous year, was set in rock used as an altar. This rock has now come to be known as the mass rock.

The inscription on the plague reads as follows: 'Holy mass was said here on 17-8-60 by Rev Fr W Hayes, First President Chaplain of the Brisbane Catholic Bushwalking Club.'

As Mt Barney is a national park, special permission was obtained from the Minister for Forestry and Agriculture. (Raoul Mellish)"

Come and voice your opinions

Queensland Federation of Bushwalking Clubs

The Forest Recreational Areas (RFA's) had been chosen and these areas would now come under a new land tenure (Holding Reserve) as outlined in the amended Nature Conservation Act (NCA). The new tenure means the land would be reserved for re-generation thus excluding activities such as 4WD, trail bikes and horse riding. Bushwalking, being a low impact activity, would still be available in these areas.

Areas such as Kroombit Tops will be one of the first to come under this new tenure. Bushwalkers generally should have no objection to the setting up of the RFA's but should keep in mind it grossly disadvantages other groups such as the ones outlined above. The Department of Natural Resources will manage the RFA's. Those areas where logging is currently taking place will see this activity phased out over a period of 20 years.

Sub-regional Forums have been established to allow local users input to the RFA process with the goal of allocating appropriate tenure and uses to public forests. Hopefully, these forums will encourage involvement by a wide spectrum of activity groups in the local management planning for outdoor recreation and to communicate recreational needs. Bushwalkers should recognise other recreational groups and continue to support a 'no net loss for other users' policy.

Regional Bushwalking groups should attend the Sub-Regional Forums within their area, especially: Sunshine Coast Hinterland Surrounds of the Main Range Surrounds of the Mt Mee

Insurance

A new policy is imminent (approx \$5) per head but there is still confusion regarding abseiling. Recently a BBW representative has been negotiating a national policy. The brokers are presently assessing the information they requested ie total members, number of claims, etc NSW will join the scheme, which will bring the number of members close to 20,000 nationally.

If the negotiations are successful the BBW representative will hand over the administration of the policy to John Scholes (VicWalk) who filled the same role last year. Abseiling will be covered under the new policy.

Regional Trails Forum

Federation representatives attended the meeting on Mon 27/03/2000 at QORF's headquarters. QPWS are pushing ahead with constructing long distance trails and seem to have funds to take them a long way to accomplishing it. The trails will be available for walkers and other activities such as horse riding and cycling. The process is close to the stage of defining the tracks. The Federation expects there will be a call for input from bushwalking clubs.

Crookneck Closure

A meeting has been arranged with the Minister of the Environment and representatives from CRAG (Crookneck Action Group). Ron Farmer has been invited as a Bushwalking representative. There is a great deal of support from the community to re-open it. Currently, access to Crookneck is still prohibited.

Sale of land on western side of Mt Barney

Blocks close to Grace's Hut have been identified as for sale. Bruce Goodall has been in contact with conservation groups in Brisbane and as a result presented a petition to a 'Ministerial Committee' including Peter Beattie asking for the government to purchase the above blocks of land. Bruce also met with Rod Welford on a separate occasion seeking additional funds to purchase the above blocks. The minister has requested Bruce to forward further details regarding this land.

Access to Glen Rock Area
