# OUTINGS IN RETROSPECT

#### Barney Mass

Eight of us left North Cuay at about 8 p.m. on Tuesday in a bus that takes twenty-five. After a stop at the Lindesay Diner we reached Yellowpinch at 11.15 p.m. At this point four of us decided to proceed up Peasants ridge that night while the others remained and set up camp.

The party that went up Barney on Tuesday night got to the hut at about 8.00 a.m. after numerous reststops including one of four hours where the leader had a sleep. In the mean time eleven walkers arrived from Brisbane at Yellowpinch at 8.00 a.m. Then ten of them proceed to go up Peasants. It rained quite heavily during this period much to the discomfort of those going up Peasant. The Tuesday night walkers at this stage were fast asleep in the hut.

At about noon, the first of day walkers arrived, so disturbing the sleep of the night walker. All the day walkers were there by 1 p.m. including John Mc Cann of Urbenville, N.S.W. Mass was then said by Father Leo Coote in the hut as it was still raining at that time.

After mass some continued having lunch while those who came in the bus left for Yellowpinch. We ware all down by 4 p.m. and the bus arrived back in Brisbane just after 7 p.m.

As far as attendence goes it was rather a poor effort by club members. There were nine members and eleven vistors. This was a poor role up for an annual event such as this apportally when you consider the finite al membership is at least fifty five.

# The Fraser Island Reserve.

This reserve began when 52 aborigines from Maryborough were removed there on a lugger by Archibald Meston early in 1897. Yet Meston did not halt here; soon he was collecting aborigines from numerous Queensland centres so by 1901 217 had been sent to the island.

No attention was given to the Aborigines' crucial connection with their local environment. To be torn away from this was to lose all connection with the past, all harmony with the present and to place the future in jeopardy. He ignored elderly aborigines pleas that they would rather be "shot than removed", claiming this was sentiment and children's thoughts".

No allowance was made for the fact that he was intermixing usually hostile tribal groups and destroying the final remnants of their identity. In April 1898 he claimed to have representatives of 10 different tribes on Fraser Island but there were undoubtedly more.

Meston alleged that in order to cure, care for and readjust aborigines, some sacrifices had to be made - but what evidence is there of shelter, medicine, hygienic care, balanced diet, education and training?

The death rate was a clearating. 57 out of 217 aborigines died 1897-1901 -(a 25% death rate); 35 of those in the 14 months from February 1900. In:3 years only 5 aborigines had been sent to Maryborough hospital. When Church of England missionaries took control of the reserve in 1900, they had to make a plea for basic first aid items like pain-killer, cough medicine and camphor lotion. No doctor visited the Island. Sickness was rampant and in 1899, a case of leprosy was discovered. In 1900, aborigines were reported to have died from consumption, syphilis, cancer of the throat, convulsions, poisoning, opium smoking. In 1901 the hasty examination of some inmates by Dr. Penny found numerous other cases.

The reason for his visit was the alarming persistence of natives at clay eating and earth eating. 6died from this 1899-1900 and in February 1901, he found 6 more cases in an advanced state of the disease, a form of acute anaemia produced by a worm in the intestines. This was induced in turn by bad sanitation and poor diet. After 6 months his visits were stopped by the Gbvernment although the was warned successful cases would "droop again" and fresh cases constantly arise.

Fenny had revealed sanitary conditions to be bad, natives were living in "gunyahs" and defactating nearby; the diet

provided being no more than maizemeal porridge with no meat, milk or vegetables. The disease reasserted itself but was seemingly kept at bay in 1903.

In 1902 it was decided to remove the children to Little Woody Island away from "the contaminating influence of the adults". This island was one of the chief sources of the clay ("dulong"). In 1903 Mary Gribble wrote that adult blacks were still eating the clay,"but we have stopped the supply to children. The children eat sand, charcoal, brick, chalk, shell and slate pencil." (Dr. Penny had written earlier that the endemic form of disease occurred when patients did not confine themselves to clay.)

What happened to the inmates of this reserve? Captain Kent revealed, Here are a list of a few who died under terrible conditions in odd corners. No doubt the protector's department can actually double the list:

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Amelia Clara Sara Carbo Ellen Stella Mary Ann Nellie Rosy Johnson Kitty Eang Jack Foxton's Wife Albert Topsy Mary Pentecost Frank Bella Willie Walker Nancy Wilson George Lem Old Kitty SaderWillie Normanton Paddy Maggie Neddie Elsie Charlie Bellie Ben

As far as I can gather most of this lot died in the Maryborough district... A terrible list... Isn't this one of the blackest pages in the history of the British Empire?

The majority of the inmates were transferred to Yarrabah - amongst them the incurably ill.

Coupled with their sickness, the Bogimbah people were regarded as the "children of sin" giving in 1904 a great deal of trouble by absconding to Cairns. Gradually, the rest of the Fraser Island people died, " re absorbed at Yarrabah, or followed onto Fitzroy Island.

In 1910 Police Magistrate Grant visited Fitzroy Island finding 10 married couples, 3 single girls and an old woman claiming to be around at a fithe Fraser Island Mission." The promise of the "property appointed and attractive reserve" had assumed in reality the form of the concentration camp


### MORE BEAUT SCANDAL.
