MT. WARNING - Overnighter

Date: 13th-14th October

Trip leaves North Quay at 3.00p.m. Saturday

This trip leaves Brisbane on Saturday afternoon to cover the 100 miles to Mt. Warning in daylight and deposit the walkers at the foot of the climb in time for tea. The ascent over 2½ miles of graded track will be made in bright moonlight at a leisurely pace-remember to bring a load of goodies for a midnight feast at the top! If the weather looks moist it would be advisable to take a tent as well. Camp will be made at the top so no sleepwalking please. Views in the morning will be panoramic taking in the nearby Tweed Range, Mt. Barney and the Gold Coast. Breakfast will be had at the cars and a return made via Numinbah Valley to include a visit to Pages Pinnacle for views of Lamington and Springbrook.

GLASSHOUSE MOUNTAINS - NEW MEMBERS DAY

Daywalk

Date: 28th October

Trip leaves North Quay behind Trittons at 9.00a.m.

Mardi Clifford will be leading the New Members walk up Mt. Beerwah (1823'), the highest of the Glasshouse group. Another party led by Brian McMahon will be climbing Crookneck (1231') Both parties will be rewarded with superb views of the many impressive peaks in this group as well as the north coast and its busy hinterland. Mt. Beerwah presents an interesting but not difficult climb with open rock slabs giving may to a water worn crevice leading to an area of bush just below the impressive cliffs known as the Organ Pipes. From there the path leads up over boulder-strewn slopes to the windswept summit. The ascent should take about two hours so bring a snack and a water bottle for a light lunch on top.

GLASSHOUSE MOUNTAINS (Cont.)

Crookneck is a more difficult climb and should be attempted by those with previous rock climbing or rock scrambling experience. After a short walk through open forest to the base of the rock the party will negotiate about 60ft. of steep slabs to a narrow ledge. Bridging a gap about 4ft. wide - known as Salmon's Leap - in the ledge is the hardest part of the ascent. From the Leap a winding scramble-path leads to the razorback at the top of the peak and the summit itself is about the size of a small room with views comparable to those from Beerwah. Remember to wear adequate footwear with rubber soles. N.B. Emergency Officer: Marnie Conway - 360361.


Cost: \$6.00 price reducing if sufficient numbers

Trip leaves North Quay behind Trittons at 7.00p.m.

This may be your last chance to see the Cherry Venture stranded on the beach south of Double Island Point not to mention the opportunity of seeing for yourself just what those sandminers are doing to the area. The walk will commence at Rainbow Beach and will cover the eight miles of coloured sand cliffs and dunes to the lighthouse on Double Island Point. After a long break at the point the throughwalkers will head south towards Freshwater Creek (campsite is flexible).

On Sunday four wheel drive tracks will take the party to Freshwater Lake and Poona Lake. Lunch will be had at Poona set in dense forest and ringed with white sand. After lunch the throughwalkers will walk out to the bitumen road and drive back to Rainbow Beach.

BIRD OF THE MONTH


Silver Gull (Seagull) Larus novaehollandiae

The fisherman knows the Seagull well for the bird is found in the coastal regions of Australasia. The Seagull has a length of 40cms. (16 inches) with a tail length of 12 cms. ($4\frac{1}{2}$ inches).

The cry of the Seagull can be described as "Kwarrk-Kwarr" which is often made by the bird when it takes off from the water. Its normal food is small fish, though it is a scavenger and eats waste human food or offal thrown from ships or fish heads and gut thrown from fishermen.

Nesting occurs in autumn and spring on islands off the eastern coast of Australia. The nest is usually a slight depression among rocks, lined with seaweed or grass with two or three eggs in it. The colour of the eggs ranges from pale green or spotted brown through to dark brown or black.

All who are going fishing on 21st October - be warned.
