EDITORIAL

Each month, as you read through your eircular (well, we hope you do !) you probably notice that we include with trip information the name and phone number of an "Emergency Officer". No doubt some of our newer members wonder just what this fear-inspiring title is all about, so - Here's the explanation.

The last thing a leader does before he/she leaves on a trip is to ring the emergency officer and give a list of names of those going on the trip. When the trip returns, the emergency officer is again advised, and knows that everyone has returned safely.

There are two ways in which the system can be used. Firstly, if you are nominated for a trip and, if at the very last moment, are delayed in reaching Roma and Turbot streets, then you should phone the emergency officer, so that when the leader rings in, the news that you are still coming can be passed on. Note that this method should be used only in emergencies and not on a regular basis.

The second use occurs if something goes wrong on the trip. If the leader can reach a phone, then he/she can contact the emergency officer and if necessary a rescue mission can be organised. If the trip is merely delayed then the emergency officer will be able to reassure anxious parents. It is therefore important that leaders phone in wherever possible if they know a trip will be returning late.

The final safeguard of the emergency officer system is that, when a leader fails to report in, then someone is aware that there is a problem and can co-ordinate any rescue activity which may become necessary.

It is up to each walker to leave the name and phone number of the emergency officer somewhere prominent before going away. Then if something does go wrong, your families will be able to contact the person who knows what's going on.

In future when you see the Emergency Officer listed with trips you'll know what it's all about - or you should.

Trip leaves on Roma & Turbot Sts., at 7,30p.m. sharp. (Please be on time as it's a long walk to Wallangarra)

This time we will be visiting the spots we've neglected over the last couple of years. Of real interest will be our visit to the Underground River. Here you actually get the chance to climb down inside a cavern where the river disappears underground. Of course, we don't suggest you try to follow it too far unless you are a midget used to living underwater!

The Wyberba district is noted for its unusual rocky outcrops. Of these, outstanding examples include the larger and therefore well-known Mt. Norman, The yramids, and Bald Rock. However, there are many smaller and lesser-known outcrops (the Aztec Temple is an excellent example) and we will give you the chance to explore these to your heart's content. Obviously, this is a trip you should not miss.

That famous expert on the Wyberba area, Edward Richardson, will be leading the trip, and will be looking for nominations at the October meeting, so have your £1 deposit ready.

OUTINGS IN RETROSPECT

FEDERATION PILGRIM GE

At the flashing torches, we were directed to the campsite - WATCH THE BUMP! We then inhabited the Binna Burra campfire and renewed some old friendships, and watched later arrivals find the bump. Saturday saw the organisation come to life, with three nearby peaks being tackled. Our eight representatives all joined the largest party, which climbed the main peak - Knapp's. We followed the creek towards the mountain, skirted towards the north around the base then went up the gapin the cliffline. Views of Barney and Maroon, as well as of other nearby mountains, were excellent.

Camp was set up in the Warrie National Park, away from the Picnic grounds, where camping is prohibited. Both days saw us walking along the graded tracks system. We did the Grand Circuit on Saturday, lunching at a spot with a commanding view of the Gold Coast Hinterland. When it wasn't raining, it was either drizzling or overcast, so the views were not as good as they could have been, but the stroll on Saturday night gave us a great view of the lights of the Coast.

Party goer of the month is undoubtedly Annie Nelson who has been having one continuous party in anticipation of her departure for 12 months in Perth.


Cheer leaders of the month were Kath and Marnie, who shone at the Federation Pilgrimage.

Country girl of the month is Cecily Palmer who believed those who told her that a certain big white cow was really a new super breed of sheep.



Trip leaves Roma Street at 7.30 sharp.

On Friday night the throughwalkers will set out up Cordeau and camp in the saddle. The party will head towards Sylvester's Lookout, where they should get excellent views of the coastal plain, weather permitting. As Sylvester's sticks out from the range mass, we shall see the cliff line that we walked along that morning. Also, we'll be able to see Mt. Castle on our left. But we won't visit it, as this is where we turn to head for the Downs. We'll set off down along the ridge, into the saddle, then up onto Devlin itself. Camp should be made on the Main Range, before this episode. After meeting the basecampers on Devlin, we will proceed down to their camp.

The b asecampers will head for the base of Mt. Devlin to pitch their tents, after dropping off the throughwalkers at the Gap. On Saturday the party will be heading for Taylor's Peak, and will be climbing both peaks of this mountain, for excellent views of the Downs towards Warwick, and around Cunningham's Gap.

Sunday's climb will be up Mount Devlin, with the tremendous incentive of a meeting with the throughwalkers to spur you to the top. If that doesn't exactly turn you on, there is no doubt that the great views from the top will. Don't miss them!
