COMING OUTINGS

BLACKFELLOWS FALLS - OVERNIGHTER

Date: 24th/25th October

Location: 17 kms to the north of and inland from Cunninghams Gap.
Meeting Time: 6.30p.m. Mass at the Cathedral or 7.15pm. after Mass, Saturday evening.
Meeting Place: Outside the Cathedral between it and the Catholic Centre.

This piece of scrub is in an out of the way place for this club, off our main routes! North of Mt. Devlin, west of Cordeau/Castle, South of Mistake Mountains. In fact this will be our first time there in many a day. John will lead you, once leaving the cars behind, into the rainforest atop the ridge. You will cross the dividing line of the water catchment and drop into the Blackfellows Creek area up near its commencement, crossing depressions which mark the birth of a creek. While these zig-zag, you will go straight towards the escarpment till the creek grows into a recognisable child. Once water is found, you will follow it to the falls. From the vantage point around the escarpment, you will appreciate the majesty of the valley into which these falls descend, the narrow "V", the steep sides, the ever green dense vegetation watered by the ever present mist kicked up by the stream crashing into the boulders below. After lunch it is a walk through the changing forest back to the cars.

This little beauty has hardly been touched, low mileage and paced by one little old man on his way to church on Sundays.

The throughwalkers will leave Christmas Creek National Fitness camp on Saturday morning and gaily skip their way up to the infamous Stinson Wreck, happily passing what is for Greg, many favourite sites. Though steep in places, it is an easy track and a rewarding area. Russ will tell you the tales of the trail, its history and its lore, as well as point out geographical features along the way. Camp will be at Point Lookout where water is 15 minutes distance. Fire wood is a lot further, so perhaps bring food which does not need cooking.

Morning from lookout is unforgettable - overlooking New South Wales with majestic Mt. Warning sentinel to the Tweed Valley, Tyalgum at its foot and the tributaries of the Tweed at your own feet. These sites will come and go as the puffs of light fluffy cloud whisk their way round your head. What a sensation!

Now you waltz along the border track towards O'Reillys (unusual for the old hands who consider this to be backwards) till Russ points out to you the turn off down. And down I mean. The faint track loses height from the majestic zig-zag ridge of the McPhersons to the meanderings of the creeks below. Coming across the farms, your party will stroll along the road to meet the basecampers in town.

BASECAMP

The warriors congregate at the camp next to National Fitness camp on Christmas Creek. Waving the throughwalkers off, the troops trudge through the gums to the saddle ending the stretcher track, then head up the side away from the stretcher track. Once atop this, magnificent views over Buchanans Fort to Widgee Ridge and O'Reilly's will fill you with ecstasy, let alone the mouth opening sight up the Christmas Creek valleys cutting into Lamington; and on the other side of the Stretcher track, Panic Button Point, junction of both Running Creeks, Mt. Gipps and more.

Mike will then show you the neglected delights of, need I announce it, Neglected Mt., by taking you along the trail across the Razorback to peer down into the Chingee Valley.

A travel to the Tweed Triangle is timed towards twilight. Your group will repass in Wiangarie, then with PACKS containing water, sleeping bags and goodies you'll enjoy a merry romp down and across to the Pumbenhill Pinnacle (of the Tweed variety) A night's rest on top, with truly amazing sunrise shots. The mob head back to the cars and off to the Gradys Creek area; a trot up to the Border and Tweed Triangle.

Return to cars for a rush trip down the Mebbin State Forest road to Lilian Rock State School, a left turn to Tyalgum to meet the trudging throughwalkers. An absolutely marvelous basecamp as it circumnavigates Lamington with a retreat via Numinbah Gap.

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PAST OUTINGS

FEDERATION PILGRIMAGE: 10th/12th September

The first contingent met in town and headed straight down the Lindesay Highway to the camp. After being checked in at the road block just before the Running Creek crossing there duties to perform: put up tents, read brochure and nominate for a walk.

Saturday dawned allowing us to view a well laid out camp, cars separated from campers and yes, toilets across a creek. At varying times we broke up and went on our particular walks - Panic Button Point, Neglected Mountain, Logans Ridge, Mt. Gipps and Grass Tree Knob. All were successful, each seeing from a different vantage point, the Running Creek, Christmas Creek or Chingee Creek valleys. Some impressive viewing, though hazy, and new territory for us.

Saturday nights' festivities commenced with the best dressed M.C. ever calling the clubs together. The acts commenced, the tempo building up as the one act plays progressed, tension audible in the murmurings of the critical audience, performers under pressure not knowing what was to come and B.C.B.C. brought the sky down being the last act. But alas, so many of us were acting on centre stage that we do not know of our huge accolades. After the rain stopped we all devoured the supper and about half commenced square dancing. Rain did not deter us and rightly so as it cleared up half way through. With some of the usual mix ups, forgotten steps and missed calls we perceived till the end. A most enjoyable night.

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MORETON ISLAND 26-27 September

I did not know the sun came up so early after a hurried breakfast off to wharf I went only to find 24 others waiting! Everyone early. It's bright at this time of night. We load up, kiss our loved ones goodnight - gee the sun's not even over the horizon yet - and like school children let out for lunch on the first day, they excitedly chatter as we set off. The morning is calm cloudless and warm. Not a ripple to disturb our progress to the world's highest sand hill.

After two and half hours of casual motoring we turn into the wrecks and beach ourselves. We get our feet wet landing, must have come up to our ankles, and with little delay, commence up the beach at 9.15 am. The first terrible slog (and with new throughwalkers aboard) was 150 metres up cone hill. Here much water was drunk, lightening many a pack. From this point the day's walking was pointed out, the ridges could be seen getting progressively higher towards Tempest in the background. It was obvious that the vegetation was far thicker than last time, and a clear track of three years ago was now treetops. Also, a recent bush fire had been through in places making walking dirtier, sunnier and not a usual pleasure.

Down we charged at 11 am, weaving our way to Flat Iron, up ridges, into gullies and around a knoll. Up onto Flat Iron and a survey of progress. Now 246 metres above the bay. 12.45 pm and still not lunch. From here I could view the twin peaks of Storm and Mt. Tempest both covered by SGIO! Down the slope, through the Blackboy Forest, up the young Eucalypt slope to the lead-in ridge of Storm. 274 metres, 1.30 pm and a final sit down for lunch. The troops got into the biscuits and lollies.

Now for the final assault. Fifty minutes later at 3.10 pm, success; 280 metres and the world was at our feet. Tempest looked so insignificant from below, but the top is alone, a point without anything around. Now the fire came to our aid, by highlighting the track down to the old telegraph line. 35 minutes saw us to the beach.

Wind rose in the night, some slept out, others put up tents. But every-

It is a movement at the service of the entire church, and develops with the ongoing needs of the church.

EDITOR'S BLURB

Our poor Outings Secretary has had a difficult month. He was so disheartened last meeting when, after asking for nominations for the Easter trip, he did not receive one nomination. This trip must be booked well in advance so I hope you've all been considering it. Later in the month, a walk had to be cancelled as Flinders Peak was in a blaze and another walk had to be arranged last minute. To make life easier for Greg, I gathered a few details about Blackdown Tableland. Hopefully by the October meeting you will know if you'd like to do the Easter trip.

Blackdown Tableland, an area covering 200 - 250 square kilometres is situated 25 kilometres south-east of blackwater, just below the tropic of Capricorn. It is north west of Isla Gorge and north east of Carnarvon Range. The area varies from 600 to 900 metres above sea level. The Ranges Expedition (named by Ludwig Leichhardt in 1844) Shotover and Dawson converge here.

This map of Australia (all minor states were omitted so as not to confuse anyone) shows the approximate location.

William Yaldwin (1836-1919) being the first lessee of the area named the tableland after "Blackdown House" the family home in Lodsworth, Sussex, England. The land was licensed as pastureland, but local farmers claimed the soil lacks certain minerals and the cattle feeding there developed "brittle bones". This may account for the low number of native animals in the area.

In 1971 the Forestry department built a road in this area that was previously relatively inaccessible, for the logging of the stringy-bark Eucalypt forests.

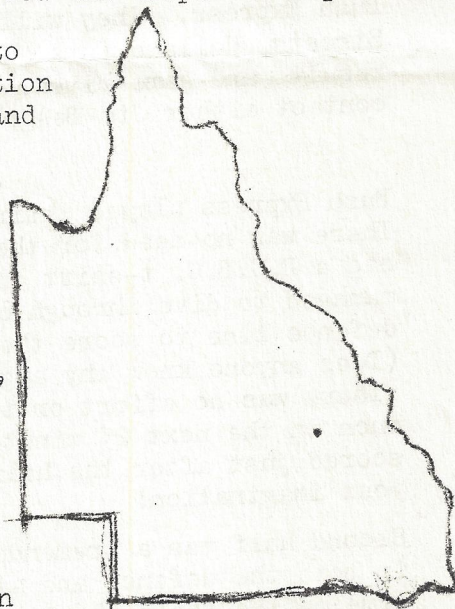
The average rainfall is 600 to 750 mm and it is obvious from the vegetation that the eastern side and the tableland is wetter than the west.

What can you expect to see on the West side by following Stony Creek: Rock overhangings, stony dry creek bed in parts but there should also be water, cliff faces featuring aboriginal stencil paintings of hands and axe; cane toads; a spectacular horse-shoe shaped amphitheatre. From Expedition Range (West side) which is mostly open gum forest and kangaroo grass, one may see the Stony Creek Falls and the plains towards Blackwater.

East side: Numerous waterfalls, cane toads, cascades, water pools, cane toads, by following either Mimosa Creek or Rainbow Creek; The latter creek features Rainbow Falls!

I've made up my mind where I'm spending Easter 1982. How about you?

A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT - MORETON ISLAND

Last month's throughwalk was to Moreton Island and all 25 of us had a most enjoyable time (perhaps not so on the return boat trip home) We all appreciated the fact, that we had the opportunity to visit an island which is mainly in its natural state.

Once we were off the beach and the main dirt road, we were on our own. This is one of the advantages of Moreton Island, to be able to retreat from civilization and yet it is only three hours from the city.

Yet there is a threat to this wilderness. Sand mining! I think most of us have read about the issue in the newspapers. The State government approved mining on 6.4% of the Island. It doesn't sound like much, but the area concerned covers half of the beach front on the ocean side. It extends from Cape Moreton in the north to the middle of the island.

On our walk we climbed Mt. Tempest and I could see the proposed mining site. Sandmining involves the removal of all vegetation and it would be tragic if this was allowed to occur. Also trucks and other machinery would be used on the beach front, and better roads would need to be built.

This would spoil the beauty and peace of the island and not enough study has been done as to determine the ecological effect on the island. Moreton Island is a popular recreational area for Brisbane and it should be developed as such. It is more valuable in its present state if a proper management plan is prepared. We should be concerned as to its fate since the island is in our "backyard"

One way to show our support is to join the Moreton Island Protection Committee. It is only \$4 and their address is P.O. Box 238, North Quay. They have support from a wide section of the community. It would be a shame to lose such a valuable asset as Moreton Island.

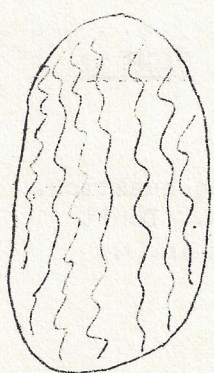

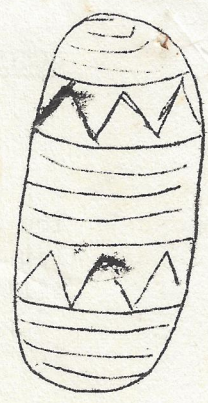
