...The new series of 3 maps is seen as a major contribution towards the management of the island. Together, the Departments control 95% of Fraser Island.

Mr. Glasson said the map showed vegetation types, camping areas, beauty spots, roads, tracks, and natural features such as the perched lakes and sand blows.

The map will be available to the public at \$3 per sheet and are expected to meet a very large demand from scientific bodies, bush-walking groups, tourists and educational bodies.

PAST OUTINGS

Boonoo Boonoo: Throughwalk Report. Midnight Express - We walk anywhere, anytime. Saturday morning saw 9 energetic walkers and 5 tired drivers head down to the bottom of Undercliffe Falls to start walking down

Bookookara Creek. We found that there was a fair amount of water in the Creek, which meant we had to climb up and around some of the rocky sections. We pushed on through the morning and early afternoon to reach our Lunch spot at 2.00pm. Here there was a large swimming hole at the base of a Waterfall, so everyone dived in for a swim! At 3.00pm., we again headed off down the creek to find the going getting tougher. At one stage we had to climb up on to the ridge, and then slowly drop back down a very steep slope back into the Creek. At 6.00pm., we again struck problems with rock faces, and the quickest way round was via the water (it is a bit cold at that time of the afternoon). Airbeds were blown up and packs floated across, while the walkers swam across. We made camp a bit further up the Banks as darkness fell. That night we dined fairly, to the extent of having too much Dessert for what we could all eat. The fire are well that night. After an early night Saturday, we were up at 6.00am., on Sunday and walking by 7.00am. We made a quick pace and reached the Junction of the Creek and Boonoo Boonoo River. After a short stop we kept on going up the River at a quick pace. On the grassy Banks we had morning tea at 11.00am., and reached the Causeway by 12.30pm. Here we broke up into two groups. The five drivers, Mark and Tony headed up to the Falls while the others headed up the Ridge via the Road. PAST OUTINGS

BOONOO BOONOO BASECAMP - Led by Val Pedrolini

We tried to leave as early as possible at 7.30p.m. for the long drive down to Undercliffe Falls campsite.

After a goody stop at Warwick we again met just before Stanthorpe, where we went in convoy for about half an hour crossing the border into N.S.W. We eventually were in bed by midnight while the drivers on the throughwalk left some cars at the Boonoo Boonoo campsite.

Saturday morning we gained two sic. throughwalkers and lost one basecamper to the throughwalk. What was a cloudy day soon turned into a really clear and hot day. After waking up early with the throughwalkers we had plenty of time to explore the area. We first walked down to the base of the falls walking through a bit of rain-forest that had quite a few stinging nettles. We then went back up and along the creek looking for a good swimming hole. We didn't have to go far when we found a good slippery slide into a pool of refreshing water. On the way back we went to the top of the falls overlooking the creek below and the paddocks in the distance. We then left the campsite driving to Bald Rock National Park. This rock was a little steep but not too high at all, only taking us about 20 mins. to climb it. The rock isn't quite true to it's name as we walked up via eucalyptus forest to escape some of the scorching heat of the sun. Once on top good views of the two Pyramids, Mt. Norman and Castle Rock were visible towards the west. Also Mt's Barney and Lindsay could be seen in the distance in the opposite direction. There was no shelter from the sun here so after signing the visitors book we descended down a little to take shelter under some huge boulders. After spotting another bare rock some of us went down to it finding it very adventurous taking two hours by the time we got back to the cars. The others had gone down the same way and waited till we rejoined for afternoon tea while David changed Jim's flat tyre. We then drove on to Boonoo Boonoo Falls campsite. It was still quite hot so we went down to the swimming area to cool off. Unfortunately I injured my leg and gave David his chance to practice First Aid on me. Thank's David for a job well done. Before sunset we put up our tents and sat around the picnic table for tea. It's usually the leader that brings the goodies but Barney was favoured by everyone for bringing along some garlic bread.

Sunday morning still another beautiful day we went up the river a little then scrambled down to the very top of Boonoo Boonoo falls where we had morning tea. Views looking down to bottom of the river and over into the open valley could be seen very clearly. From here it was a steep climb down so we took to the cliff and joined onto the track that took us down to the river. This time we viewed the falls looking upwards which were quite impressive. The falls are in two sections being divided by a platform of rock and deep swimming holes. Therefore we make the steep climb up and had lunch. After cooling off five continued down the river and met up with the throughwalkers while the rest of us went back slowly up the steep track. The throughwalkers were out later than expected therefore we all went to the 7p.m. Mass at Stanthorpe. It was a most enjoyable trip as the weather matched the area perfectly.

MT.MAY-- DAYWALK -22 NOVEMBER, 1981.

It's time again to resurrect those slides taken on those unforgettable occasions. To enter into the Annual Slide Competition you must be a member and have taken them while being a member of this club. This time we will make it a little easier for you to enter, by allowing you more than the last twelve months old slides as long as they have not been entered in previous club competitions.

The slides will be judged at the January General Meeting on 18th of January '82. Mr. Bill Smit will be our judge once again.

There will be four categories:-

1. Scenic - taken on club trips, including pre-outings or socials.
2. Scenic - taken on holiday trips or private trips.
3. Nature - animals, plants etc. taken in their natural habitat on club trips or holiday trips.
4. People - one or more persons taken on club functions e.g. walks, socials or meetings.

N.B. The following are required:-

I've never yet dared look down.

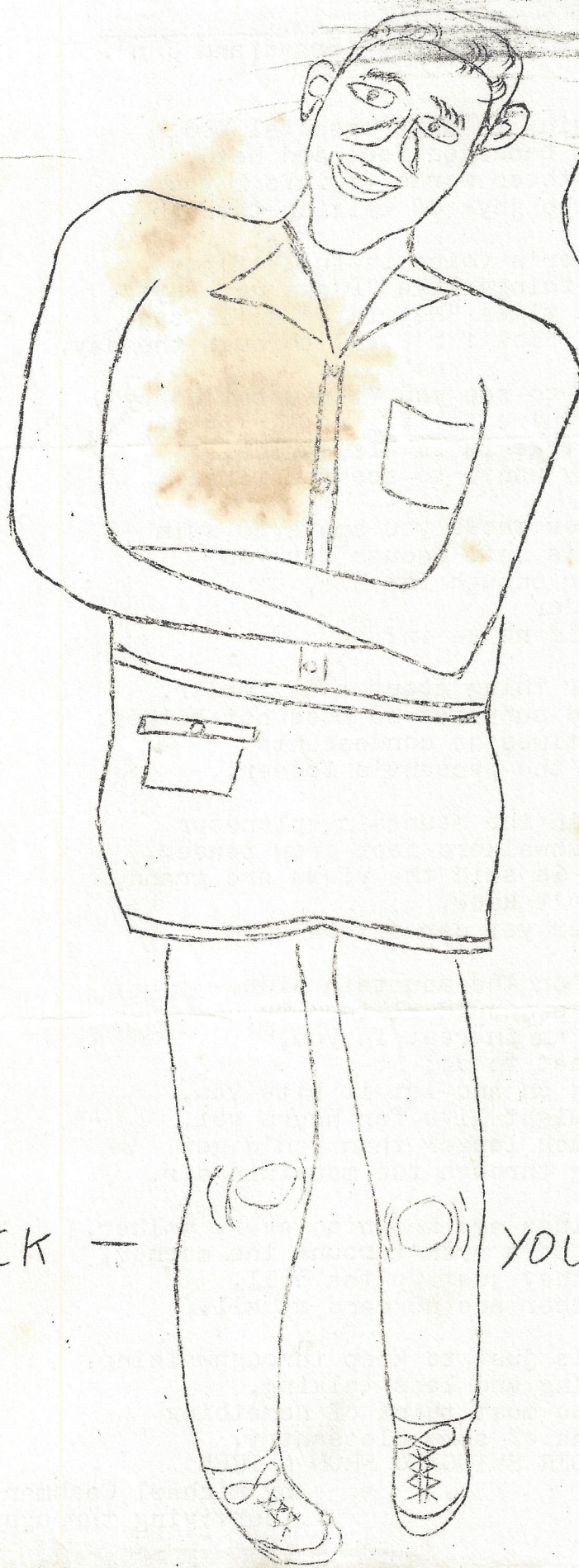
Up there on the mountain side,
