Can you imagine a more beautiful place to be in to start the Bicentennial Year? Camp beside a crystal clear creek amongst Australia's rainforest - land that remains unchanged for years and years. If you are a romantic at heart and dream of being an explorer, then come and join this little adventure and imagine that nobody has been here before you.

Washpool National Park is situated between Grafton and Glen Innes on the Gwydir Highway, its southern boundary border Gilbrator Range N.P. It was declared a National Park in the past few years only as a result of conservation lobbying in the '70s. It has been declared a wilderness area with only the southern end being developed - the rest of the park is only accessible by walking.

We will leave Brisbane at 7pm and travel down via the Cunningham/New England Highways to Glen Innes where we turn eastwood along the Gwydir Highway. Somewhere along the New England Highway, we will stop and our small band of adventurers will celebrate the beginning of the New Year. Hopefully, we will reach the camping area of the park by 2am, January 1st, 1988.

Next morning, after a late start (8am), we will walk along a ridge for 2/3 hours. At Spot X, we will drop down to another ridge or creek to Pli Pli flats where we will set up basecamp - hopefully there will be time for a swim before tea.

Pli Pli Flat is on the eastern side of Washpool Creek set amongst eucalypt forest it is a clearing which legend says was made by aborigines. So, in the glow of a campfire with running creek water in the background and sharing a story or two - sound relaxing?? Come along and find out.

The next day, we will go exploring further down the creek. The country is renowned for its rainforest and deep gorges. We shall just carry a day pack and, if time permits, we may be able to explore a side gorge. Then, back to the Pli Pli for another hard night in the bush.

The next day we start early for the climb out. We will return via a similar route as we walked in and hopefully be back at the cars early afternoon. Then the drive back to Brisbane to be home that night.

RESCUES:

The silly season is upon us again when non-club walkers tend to go bush and get lost. All experienced members and most new walkers, are liable to be called out on a rescue. The more people out there, the better is the chance of finding the victim alive. alive.

- 1. Be prepared
- 2. When phoned, say "Yes".
- 3. Keep non-perishable food in your cupboard, i.e., 2 small tins of tinned meat - "Spam"; 2 small tins fruit, i.e., "Snak Packs", dry biscuits and spreads.
- 4. You wont have time to go shopping.
- 5. You may operate rescue base, radio relay, do a throughwalk, or repetitive brush or comb searches.
- 6. No prior experience needed.

Anyhow, we finally fought our way through the Friday night party traffic and headed down Highway 1.

After a quick goodie stop at Brunswick Heads that was timed to perfection as one interstate bus had just left and our orders were filled before the next bus arrived. Up through the winding back roads, we finally arrived at Rummerg Park at 11.30pm but being a full moon we decided to take in the views so we drove up to Peates Mountain Lookout and enjoyed the views of the lights of the towns and the lighthouse at Cape Byron. On the way down, Fauline discovered a snake just before she stood on it. It appeared to be a Stephens Banded Snake. It never ceases to amaze me what people take for food on walks. For morning tea, we had home-made chocolates from Mary Phillips, and Eugene brought along some huge biseuits.

We continued along the Mt. Nardi-Nightcap track and then ventured down Wallaces Road to Tuntable Falls. These falls are absolutely magnificent with a sheer drop down to a delightful rock pool. Justin was eager to lead a future walk into the pool from below the falls. Some people would do anything to have a swim. By dropping rocks over and counting the seconds, Ken McCarron estimated the falls to be over 100 metres high. Well, how far can a rock fall in 4 seconds ???

The water in the creek must have been cold as it took 40 minutes to boil and then only after we made wind breaks around the top of the stove.

On the way back, we took a detour to look at Mt. Matheson. Mary was kind enough to watch our packs as we made a quick dash up the hill. However, the trees obscured the views of Mt. Warning. The rainforest on the plateau was very similar to the vegetation near Bare Rock north of Cunninghams Gap. Finally, after a bit of indecision, we found ourselves at the lookout and enjoyed views of the Tweed Pinnacle, Mt. Warning, Mt. Cougal, Boyd's Butte and Jerusalem Mountain. It was getting late and we had a 12 km walk in front of us so we stepped into overdrive to make it back to the bus by 6.30pm.

An interesting little plant was everywhere. It had flowers that appeared to come from the middle of the leaf and it had six petals of a violet or lilac colour. It was only a small plant about 30 cm high with numerous stems about 50 cm long and leaves about 8 cm long with an oval shape. Through luck, I found out that it was called a Sarsparilla Lily, but it didn't look like a lily.

On Basecamps we normally have a long dinner and talk around the camp fire. However, this time the gruelling day had us all in bed by 9pm. The campsite at Rummerg Park had a few modern conveniences - tank water, a shed for cooking called the "Galley", picnic tables in another shed, toilet blocks and showers - but they were cold. This did not prevent several of our members refreshing themselves.

Sunday morning 'dawned magnificently without a cloud in the sky. We started down the Boggy Creek Track at about 8.00am. Our first discovery was that Australia was killing the Kiwis in the cricket. Our second discovery was these strange red fruits about $1\frac{1}{2}$ " in diameter that looked like cricket balls. I have since been informed that they are the Red Bopple Nut and quite edible like its closest relative - the Macadamia Nut. Our third discovery was that Boggy Creek was misnamed - it was not boggy at all but was exposed rock slabs with numerous quiet pools.

We got to the top of Minyon Falls about 9am and enjoyed the views down over the Repentance Creek Valley. The track around to Condong (Quondong) Falls was through open eucalypt country with the Quondong Trees (Blueberry Ash) in flower just for us. The Box forest along the valley bottom was very strange as there was no undergrowth amongst the Boxes Figs or Palms.

The inviting cool pool was soon enjoyed by those who brought their togs and we lazed around the pool for over an hour. The trip back to the top at Minyon Grass took only 35 minutes and was noticeable for the thick undergrowth primarily the stream lily or Mehnholzias Lily which was in flower.

After a quick lunch, we started on our return journey which was highlighted by the views of Byron Bay and our stop at Kingscliff for a swim and ice creams all round.

We got back to Brisbane at 5.30 after one of the more enjoyable walks of the year. Thanks to all those who came: Justin Tobin, Eugene Behan, Michael Breen, Russell Code, Ken McCarron, Monica Casey, Mary Phillips, Anne Hayes and Pauline Hayes.
