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FERCITURE AFTICLE

A Statement by Dr. Mostafa K. Tolba, Executive Director, United Nations Environment Programme.

"Environment and Peace" is this year's theme for World Environment Day and millions of people are involved, from presidents to school children. But more people are doing nothing. They neither know nor care that to-day is World Environment Day. It is to those that I want to address myself to-day. And my message is simple:

There will be no peace until there is peace with nature.

The job of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) is to build that peace. Our job is to help nations use and share our natural resources wisely.

If we use energy more efficiently there need be no fight over oil. If we conserve our seas and rivers there need be no fight over water. If we hold back the deserts and save the soil there need be no conflict over land. If we share the bounties of our world fairly, there need be no famine.

Such measures will guarantee the long term security of nations. UNEP has no patience with the argument that financial resources are not available. What the world spends on guns in seven months could bring clean water to as many as two billion people. What we spend on arms every eight hours might be enough to eradicate malaria. What we spend on weapons every 20 minutes would more than pay for all of UNEP's year's work. UNEP also worries about the wastage of human and natural resources on the development of weapons of destruction. More than 70 million people serve the war machinery. Over 3 million of the world's best scientists and engineers are engaged in military research and development. Freparations for war absorb scientific and technological capabilities 10 times as great as are available to all the developing countries put together. The military consumption of petroleum is close to one and a half times the consumption by all the developing countries.

The mis-use of our human and natural resources is the invisible threat to our fragile and imperfect peace. Investment in more arms, ever more lethal, will not address these major threats to peace.

A new definition of security is needed. One that recognises how the exhaustion of the global resources base sours relations between states and raises tensions within nations. Pollution of rivers and seas, overfishing, deforestation, poisoning of ecosystems - are some of the factors which are raising political tension between and among nations.

Nations will have meaningful security only when they cease to undermine the ecological foundations of the global economy.

Nations spend close to two million dollars a minute on arms, and yet they do not enjoy peace or security. If a tenth of what was spent on arms was spent on harvesting our resources, or pushing back the desert, or saving the forests, or keeping the air and the oceans clean - then I believe the world would reach the dawn of security.

The role of each one of us ... the role of the individual ... is vital. UNEP is vital. On World Environment Day UNEP is asking every capable person to plant a tree for peace. And on the day when your country commemorates its war dead, plant a tree - a symbol of life, and a symbol of peace with nature."

CAMPAIGN OF LOVE

My Dear Reader, I am writing this as a personal letter to YOU.

THINKING CATH(

You desire to love Jesus very much, and you would like to inspire others to love Him. I am going to tell you how you can love Our Lord more deeply yourself, and how you can help many other persons to love Him.

* * * * * * * * * *

When Jesus lived on earth He was such a lovable Person that large crowds followed Him everywhere. He had a refined human nature, sensitive emotions, and a responsive human heart. He was a sympathetic, gentle, kind, understanding and forgiving Person. St. John writes of Jesus as God: "God is love" (1 John 4,8). We can say of Him as Man: "Jesus is lovable." When Jesus on the Cross spoke the words: "I thirst" (John 19, 28), He expressed the desire of His Sacred Heart to be loved by you and me, and by every

Jesus has given us so many wonderful things: our existence, our faith, His grace, and He forgives our sins if we are sincerely sorry for them. He loves us so much that He suffered and died on the cross for us, so that we might be happy with Him forever in heaven.

I am asking you to make a special effort to develop the habit of thinking of Jesus often each day, and every time you think of Him to whisper several times the prayer: "My Jesus, I love You." Try to do this every day of your life, and encourage others to do the same.

If we ask people to do this, and if they in turn persuade others, think what will happen! Beginning as a small group, the number will grow into hundreds, then into thousands. The work we begin during our lives will be taken up and carried on by other persons, and will continue to spread after our death, until from a vast number of hearts all around the globe the words: "My Jesus, I love You," will echo millions



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It will help us to live intimately with Jesus if we remember that, as God, the Person of Jesus is always with us. He is around us and in us, living in our hearts and our souls.
