Here is your chance to visit an area not frequented often by the Club (last T/W in 1977). This will be an easy to medium throughwalk, along the Severn River and its tributaries. On Friday night we will camp at the southern end of the Park in the camping ground. Following the river upstream about 12kms will involve little actual rock hopping on Saturday. Most of the walking will be beside the creek.

Camp will be established near Blue Gorge, which can be explored. The second day is a day walk further up the river, and features such as Rat's Castle will be seen before returning to the campsite. On Monday we walk back down to the campsite.

Sundown National Park (6,800ha) is adjacent to the Qld-NSW border, south-west of Stanthorpe. It is a very rugged area with high ranges and the Severn River carving a course through them. The majority of the walk will be in the valley. It is an unusual area with different landform features and vegetation, as compared to Girraween to the east.

As it is summer, please bring a 2 litre water bottle, sunhat etc. Walking will commence early in the morning, so as to allow longer rests (and swims) in the heat of the day. This walk will be a good introduction to the area, which can be explored to greater depth in the cooler months. Also, Mass can be attended at the Corinda or Kedron parish churches at 7pm on Monday night.

# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

If you take a close look at the aims of this Club as stated in the Constitution, you will see that as one of the aims is to maintain friendly relations with the Brisbane Catholic Family Bushwalking Club. By the time you read this, such a Club will have just come into existence. The principal aim of the Club will be to provide a framework where Catholic families can enjoy bushwalking together. The type of walking offered will be different from BCBC as it is unlikely to offer throughwalks, while there will be a number of basecamps.

Once the Family Club is established, it will have two main benefits for the Club. Namely, it will provide a trained source of supply of new members when the children of the Family Club turn 18. Secondly, the Family Club will provide a means for older members of the Club to stay in touch with the Club via participation in the Family Club.

It is anticipated that the Family Club will share some of the resources of BCEC, such as Post Office Box, Entry in Telephone Book and duplicator. The activities programmes of the two clubs will probably coincide with events such as the Barney Mass, Federation Pilgrimmage and Family Bar-be-que. Otherwise, the two Clubs will have separate programmes and separate circulars.

In order to assist the Family Club to get on its feet, a raffle will be held at the January meeting and the proceeds from it will go to the Family Club.

The existence of the Family Club should help BCBC in other ways such as:-

- 1. Easier access to people who have completed different or unusual walks which have not been done recently;
- 2. More people (and hopefully expertise) to help with the maintenance of the Club hut);
- 3. A source of people for Club bus trips which will help to keep costs down.

The other matter I should like to mention is that at the February meeting a new Committee will be elected to lead the Club through 1985. It is now time to consider whether you could make a contribution to the running of the Club.
