The titles of these Sub-committees indicates their functions.

The song book sub-committee was formed because the General Committee has agreed that the Club should produce a Song Book. It will contain the usual campfire songs plus a number of hymns and Christmas Carols. This should allow the Song Book to be used at many more events than previous editions have been.

One of the tasks of the New Members and Publicity Sub-Committee will be to organise a feature for each monthly meeting. January/February became one of my busiest months, so much history and many different tribes still living in the Middle East countries. Visited the holy towns of Nazareth, Bethlehem, Jerusalem and Tiberias on the Sea of Galilee. Nazareth and Bethlehem have a predominantly Arab population. Jerusalem is a mixture of Jew, Arab, Christian, Protestant and Moslem peoples all living in their own quarters and usually quite oblivious to the events and mishaps of their neighbour. Tiberias is a beautiful holiday resort village. An Arab sherut driver took 6 people on a tour of the West Bank, including areas of the 6 day war; The Syrian and Lebanese borders. We were quite lucky he took us on Shabbat (the Jewish sabbath) as this is another town that literally dies from sundown Friday to sundown Saturday.

In the West Bank many fields are wired off with WARNING and DANGER signs along the fence (only written in Hebrew) and many cows chewing away in the fields. If one less cow comes home at night, well that's one less land mine to worry about. On no man's land between the Lebanese and Israeli border, a radio station "Voice of Hope" is broadcasting; seems pretty hopeful to me. Many Kibbutz and moshav in the area, so the countryside is green and many beautiful gum trees line the river bank. The oasis town of Jericho is full of fresh fruit stalls and is a quite and pleasant town. This, the lowest city in the world has very few remains of the ancient city, but beyond these remains is the arid refugee camp, remnants of the '67 war.

This area uses the River Jordan for irrigation which once fed the Sea of Galilee which in turn fed the Dead Sea. Due to the loss of its inlet, the Dead Sea is disappearing and there is now a clear walk between Jordan and Israel in this area, also clearly marked military posts! I spent 2 days at Ein Gedi gazing at Jordan remembering my overland journey to Europe. I was sitting on the opposite bank of the Dead Sea in Jordan exactly 6 months previously in soaring mid 40°C temperatures and that was night time! To get to Ein Gedi, I left Jerusalem in a snow storm and arrived in 17°C which was hot t-shirt weather to me. Ein Gedi has a national park. Enter at your own risk. Not mines, but tigers.

A little south is Masada - quite a steep climb before sunrise but well worth the strain; what a massive fortress with its own elaborate temples, tanning factory, 2 bakeries, palace and much more.

Next important stop was Cairo, Egypt. After the very clean and healthy living of Israel, the life style, dust, noise and unhygienic conditions of Egypt was a startling wake-up, back to the fight for a living every step of the way, every minute of the day.

The Cairo Museum was a warehouse of mummies and statues of God's, beautiful artifacts from Tutankharem's tomb and other valuables. The pyramids and sphinx were all I imagined, reminding one of the strength and pride of a past civilization. South of Cairo and upstream on the Nile we came to Luxor, a much smaller and quieter town to Cairo. Here there is the massive Luxor temple which in years gone by had a road to the Karnak Temple lined on both sides with proud ram headed sphinxes. The Karnak Temple was filmed in Agatha Christie's "Death on the Nile". In Luxor one can hire bikes,



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catch the ferry to the east side of the Nile and pedal for miles to the Valley of the King's. Of course this area had to be hidden from raiders and protected from the Nile flooding - the ride ended up being a little longer than I bargained for, but worth every push - beautifully painted tombs of many kings, Tutankhamen's being one of the small and plain ones. Further upstream to Aswan, we made this the end of our adventure in Egypt and travelled to the Sinai desert stopping at Sharm el Sheikh on the East Coast and on the Red Sea. There is a beauty in starkness and rugged distant mountains that change colour in the sunrise, sunshine, dusk and haze. Had quite an eventful trip with the military on the return trip to Cairo - briefly the vehicle I was in was pulled up at an M.F.O. checkpoint and I was told that I was not to travel on this particular vehicle any further.....

"Why not?"

"No proper papers, Ma'am"

"I'm in the middle of the Sinai Desert"

"Yes Ma'am"

"How should I reach Cairo from here?"

"Um...well Ma'am...um...I'm just acting under orders Ma'am."

I walked 10 yards beyond the military check point, put my thumb out and who should drive past... why the very vehicle I just hopped off! Onto Cairo, not reaching it till midnight. Flew to Athens from here, arriving in another snowstorm.

On the morning of 22.2.83 I was told I had a flight in 5 hours to Singapore - time enough to ring home, pack bags and get to airport. Spent 24.2.83 in Singapore and arrived in Australia at 8.00a.m. on 25.2.83

Pleased to be home, a pleasure to speak English, nice to have Nescafe and be able to drink water from the tap. I am wearing clean clothes and had a shower last night adjusted to a temperature of my choice, my bed has no bugs and a mosque doesn't chant me awake at 6.00a.m. I don't want to change money on the black market, no hashish thank you, came from Sharm el Sheikh, travelling 10½ months, going to Australia, not married, no I don't want to marry you or take you home, what do I want 10 camels for, do I get a fork with my omelette - No! okay Shalom, Salem... and Giddyay.

What you didn't enter? Yes it is free.

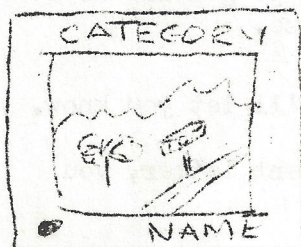
Well-ll- Here are the categories.
