*** THE LITTLE KING'S MOVEMENT ANNUAL DOOR-KNOCK APPEAL:

As the sun came up on Sunday, 8th February, it went completely unnoticed as it was well hidden behind black clouds - clouds which threatened to dampen the spirits (and the shoes) of 19 intrepid bushwalkers who took to the city streets that morning for the worthy cause of door-knocking on behalf of the handicapped. Many thanks to Marina M, Desley P, Cathy McD, Bonno N, Anne and Pauline E, Liz O'R, Wayne A, Russ N, Carmel McN, Joe F, Sue H, Justin T, Geoffrey E, Diana B, Tim and Yolanda A and John M who were even prepared to brave wet weather, which didn't eventuate, thank God.- at least not until after the time that Desley and I told Him would be convenient!

Since one of the main problems encountered by our group (apart from too-friendly dogs and over-zealous pensioners emptying their entire coin collections into our bags to weigh them down), was a lack of sufficient publicity about the Movement, I thought it might be opportune to print their summary statement here. That way, at least another 200 or so people will be aware of LKM's existence and perhaps you could spread the word, so that next year's appeal will be even more successful. As it is, public response in the Graceville/Chelmer area was very good and we managed to collect a grand total of \$1,105.94 which was very gratefully received by the Movement.

This represents a 20% increase on last year's amount, so the organisers were particularly impressed by our Club's effort. Congratulations, B.C.B.C.

SUMMARY

"The Movement is: * a caring community group concerned about people ... about their needs which are outside the therapeutic field, outside the physical or sensory areas, outside the clinical facts of the particular handicap.

Since 1967 the Little King's Movement for the Handicapped has been closely associated with the training of handicapped children and adults in social adjustment and spiritual values.

To-day the Movement is in regular contact with over 600 people - young and old, physically disabled, those with visual problems, the hearing impaired, and the intellectually handicapped.

All members of the Movement are unpaid, all services are free, and all funding comes from a very generous and caring public.

The L.K.M. is very grateful for this support - and encouraged by it."

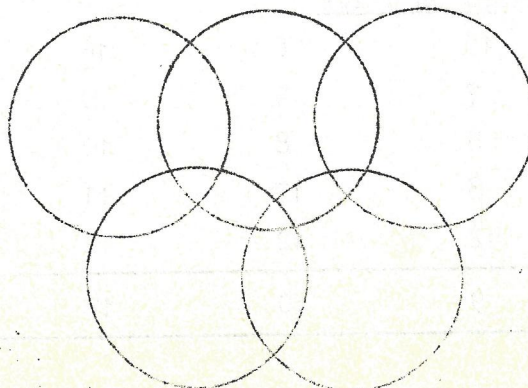
