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PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

The Club was looking at incorporation a few years back to protect members from possible catastrophic legal action but it now seems that incorporation will not achieve this. Incorporation also includes much paper work, high fees and the possibility of fines. Binna Burra Bushwalkers have investigated insurance and have taken out a special Club and Association Policy from Suncorp which gives \$1,000,000 public liability cover and \$1,000 club property insurance. This means that each member is covered against legal action for bodily injury or damage to property brought by any person, whether another member or an outsider.

The cost is an extremely reasonable \$70 for 100 members. I have taken the liberty of getting a cover note for a policy as described above. We could also possibly cover the club hut, but, as we don't own the land, we don't technically own the hut. With the Lower Portals now so accessible, the need for the hut has diminished. Also, if the hut suffers major damage, I don't feel as though we would replace it.

A motion will be put to the next meeting by which time the exact details should be known.

This walk is out of the ordinary, in that it starts Thursday p.m. of this Anzac Day long weekend. Also, you pay for your own transport costs, meet at the cathedral as usual, but reimburse drivers yourself and pay \$25.00 extra to the Club for costs.

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You shall travel down Highway 6 to Makarora, spending Thursday night (or what's left of it) at the caravan park. Then off in the jet boat at 8am up the Makarora River to the Young. De-boat and up packs. There is 3 hours pleasant walking up the pretty, shady, gradual right bank of this river, making numerous photo stops and morning tea at the first grassy clearing. Lunch is at the junction of the north and south branches. Bring your Rid if you don't want to become sore.

After a leisurely halfhour here, he happens to want to wander up the watery In other words, walk up the south branch, following the markers up the right way. It is steep the first half kilometre, with a good mud slide right at the bank. commencement. But don't you worry 'bout that. You will find yourself continuing to climb, and when you rest in "The Bend", you automatically know that half this final section is behind you. Surrounded by waterfalls, this select party continues looking for the night's hut, searching, scanning the heights to the front, with the sides towering above. Lastly, Loretta (or Desley, or Wayne, Steve or Liz) sight the sun on the shining roof. A yell, cheering and the final assault. Firewood Twenty minutes later, shoes off, ford the creek (cold is collected on the move. at 7pm) and run up to the hut. Could take three attempts to light the pot belly stove, but it is drying warmth when it commences to roar.

Out with the food:- soup, roast lamb, peas, mash, instant pud and fruit. A feast for walking kings and queens. And there before us, is Gillespie Pass, 1600 metres, Mt. Awful always towering over us at 2,202 metres, camping at 1,000 m. A quiet still night, all the stars out to greet you - Milky Way will cut the deep black sky in two, Magellanic Clouds, Southern Cross and, of course, the Super Nova

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shining bright.

Next morning off early to cross the pass. Firstly, you must cross the creek, then along for half an hour. Then it's time for the up-ridge. Meander across its front zig, then zag. The snow-field opposite gets larger as you get higher. Mt. Awful gets better. Stark, grey, serrated mountain tops will surround you. Sharp, clear, shear. The valley floor below disappears. After several rest breaks, the troops will find lunch at the top. And what a view to greet you. Mountain tops, beyond mountain tops, all 360 degrees around you. And the ice-shelf on Awful, cold, solid, blue, split level and the waterfall from it. You had better bring along spare film as you will take too many shots here.

Follow along the side of the ridge, descending slowly along the scree. If lucky, you may even walk across patches of snow (and have a snowball fight), photograph Mt. Cook lillies and see some wildlife. Down the grassy slope, into the beech forest and to the floor of the Young Basin. The hard work is over and only two hours to the next hut.

For Sunday, you will follow Siberia Stream downstream to the cascades and out into the Wilkin for your ride home. Come along, only moderate experience required.

Summing up the day, I feel everybody who attended learnt from the day and what these training days are about. Don't be afraid to come along to your first everybody has to start somewhere. Federation Mountain Rescue is a worthwhile organisation and need your support for you to get the most out of it.
