After leaving the Cathedral at 7.30PM (sharp) we will drive via Rathdowney to Border Loop on the Lions Road to Kyogle.

The walk will start at the Tick Gate on the Lions Road and will floow mainly the Border fence. The interstate rail line passes through a tunnel at the Border Loop and we will cross over this shortly after the start of the walk. With a little bit of luck we might even see a train. From there on it is up and down (with some big ups!) passing through open forest and rainforest with good views into the Running Creek valley.

During the morning we will pass the Falls on Long Creek, and if time permits we may drop down for a closer view of these Falls. Some time during the afternoon we will pass through a clearing, from which one obtains one of the best views of South East Qld.

Camp on Saturday night will probably be along the fence (or could even be at an old rabbit board hut near Mt. Tanna). On Sunday we will continue along the fence, taking a detour to avoid the steep climb over Mt. Tanna. As we near Mt. Lindsay we will drop down from the Border fence and head across. country to the rabbit board hut at the base of Mt. Lindsay. From there it is an hours walk out to the Mt. Lindsay Highway. After another car shuffle we will then head back to Brisbane.

Even though the walk is relatively long, it is a moderate walk with excellent views. Water will have to be carried for the trip, however there is a possibility that it can be obtained at one of the rabbit board huts.

Binna Burra Bushwalkers will also be doing this trip on the same weekend - however starting from our finishing point. Hopefully along the way we will meet one another and maybe have a chat and a goodies stop. Probably we will be able to atrange a car shuffle to suit both ourselves and our friends from Binna Burra Bushwalkers.

PRESIDENT'S FILMET

I have been visted by the Suncorp Insurance representative and have tentatively twan out the same policy as Binna Burra Bushwalking Club, that is \$1,000,000 public liability cover and \$1,000 club property insurance (for printing equipment at G. Endicott's address). This means that each member is covered against legal action for bodily injury or damage to property bought by any person, wether another member, visitor or outsider. If you are not a member or have not paid your subscription, you are not covered. If you are married and only pay \$15.00 subscription, your spouse is not covered.

The cost is \$70.00 and will be voted on at the June meeting.

I would remind everyone that we take risks on every walk. There maybe slippery rock, steep slopes, loose rocks, snakes, leeches, ticks, stinging nettle, stinging tree, wait a while, lantana, dust, fire, storms, frost, deep water, fast flowing streams, cliffs and you may get lost or be led astray. An outings description is a very subjective description, subject to the experience of the walker, the memory of the writer and the weather conditions. If you are not willing to accept these risks and be prepared to take the responsibility yourself, please take up a less demanding past-time.

Despite all this, bushwalking is a very rewarding experience which I would recommend in some form to everyone. Happy walking.

PROSPECTING NOTES.
