Along the range north of Cunningham's Gap and Mt Cordeaux lies an escarpment running due magnetic north. This escarpment is aptly named, The Ramparts.

After a drive to The Gap and a car shuffle, we will enjoy a night stroll up Mt Cordeaux - and the accompanying views of dark mountains. A little further on is Morgan's Lookout, probably our campsite for the night.

We have now completed most of the uphill walking for the weekend. From Morgan's Lookout we can see the rest of the walk and realize how easy it will be. Views from Bare Rock are good (some may say excellent) - north and south along the Main Range (come and see all those hills you want to climb or have climbed).

Shortly after Bare Rock we follow the escarpment and some blazes north. On Saturday afternoon we will reach Sylvester's Lookout and will be able to see from whence we came. A mere hour's walk away is a nice campsite with good views, a healthy breeze, plenty of firewood, but no running water. This is the junction of the Little Liverpool, Mistake and Main Ranges.

On Sunday, we drop down to Laidley Falls and contour around to Hole-In-The-Wall, then continue up to Boar's Head. Dropping packs, we skip along to Mt Castle. If you have ever sat below the rock "turrets" in the shade of a Xanthorrhoea and gazed up into the sun whilst watching a hovering eagle, you may imagine (Con't) JULY 1905

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why it was called Mt Castle. After lunch at Boar's Head, we will drop down to the grassy foothills below.

The Ramparts trip always wins the award for 'easiest throughwalk of the year'. It is excellent for beginners and ageing throughwalkers with arthritis in the joints

RICHMOND GAP TO NUMINBAH GAP - Throughwalk - Leader: Mark Daly

No wonder this epic takes place every 3 years. This walk seems to follow a pattern, especially in weather; wet and cool for 2 days rounding off dry on the last.

Following a rough time organising transport, the 8 leaders finally made it to Richmond Gap and, sure enough, the rain came down when we began our slog up Mt Gipps. We found an old maintenance shack half an hour past the summit and set up camp by 12.00.

Following an interesting, moist night, we found ourselves back on the border fence track spending a delightful Saturday strolling through pleasant aquatic surroundings. The forest thickens with an abundance of nettles, wait a whiles, and leeches, the terrain becoming more dramatic as we approach Point Lookout.

Through careful planning, 8 leaders elected a campsite and fumbled in the dark for firewood before settling down for grub.

Sunday was a good day - although moist, it provided excellent views of abundant mist from Point Lookout.

On our way to Throakban, a group of us leaders ventured off to fetch water, only to become geographically embarrassed for a period until the remaining party located us. This is a good indication of the thick scrub and rough terrain.

Passing Rat-A-Tat Hut, we pitched camp in a clearing by the main track, and lit a bonza fire (was a hot rock night). On Monday things began to dry up, the track was good and views were enough to induce asthma.

Summitting Mt Wagawn by 1pm, we had a fine view of the Numinbah Valley and the border gate; seeing our transport had not arrived we emptied packs, boiled the billy and devoured the relics carried - puddings, chocolate and cream biscuits, cheese, salami etc, making our descent to Bushrangers Cave and onto the border gate a light toil.

MT MICHAEL TO LAIDLEY GAP - Throughwalk - 28/30 June Leader: Geoffrey Egert

At the next meeting the leader will hand down a tablet containing 2 new bushwalking commandments which are set out as follows:

1. Thou shalt not whine on a bushwalk

2. Thou shalt not treat thy leader like a 'nong'.

The rationale for the formulation of these commandments may be found in the following tale of the bushwalk from Mt Michael to Laidley Gap.

The walk commenced at the Cathedral on Friday night, 28th June. The advance party, JC, Greg and Russ, set off in

JC's car, with the packs, bound for Junction View, whilst the main party boarded the hired mini-bus and headed for the leader's place. At the leader's place Val, one of the walkers, and Tim and Yolanda, whose task it was to return the mini-bus after the walkers were deposited at Junction View, joined the main party.

The main party headed first for Gatton College where it was to wait for JC to return from Junction View. Tim, who was driving at this time, decided to take the group on a tour of the various car parks. It was during this time that a security man stopped us in the midst of the "poultry farm" and questioned our bona fides. Once JC was safely aboard, we headed for Junction View and arrived at 10.50pm.

Upon the dawning of the cold new day it took a big fire and some goading by the leader before the troops would venture out of their tents at 6.30am. After breakfast we headed up Mt Michael, down in to the saddle, and then up Mt Haldon where we arrived at 1.00am. This was the hardest part of the walk and the leader must state quite categorically that he hasnothing but admiration for the new walkers (Julie, Ann, Pauline and John) and the determination exhibited by them on this part of the walk. (Note: If Greg collapses in a heap on the top of the mountain then you know the task has not been easy.)

After taking in the views offered by Haldon, we headed off at 11.45am for Rocky Point. After another 1½ hrs of walking, we had lunch on a very pleasant knoll (884m high). Mike boiled a billy and it was with renewed vigour that we set off to conquer Rocky Point. This conquest occurred at 3.30pm and brought wonderful views of endless mountain ranges. But, alas, gentle readers, it was by this time that the leader had formulated his first commandment - "Thou shalt not whine on a bushwalk". SETTING THE MEMORIAL PLAQUE ON MT. BARNEY By Raoul Mellish

On the Saturday afternoon of May 13, 1961, a brass plaque commemorating the Mass said by Fr. Hayes on Mt. Barney on Exhibition Wednesday of the previous year, was set in the rock used as an altar. This rock has now come to be known as "The Mass Rock".

The inscription on the plaque reads as follows:-

"HOLY MASS WAS SAID HERE ON 17 - 8 - 60 BY REV. FR. W. HAYES FIRST PRESIDENT CHAPLAIN OF THE BRISBANE CATHOLIC BUSHWALKING CLUB".

As Mt. Barney is a National Park, special permission for this was obtained from the Minister for Forestry and Agriculture.

The work of setting the plaque took most of the afternoon, as the rock had to be cut back to a level recess and drilled to take the holding screws, and it was not until the last light of day was shafting golden on high battlements of the mountain, that the job was completed.

Also set in the rock just below the plaque was a metal Club badge left at the site last Easter by Fr. Hayes, who was paying his last visit there before going to Ireland.

A log book in a muntz metal container was left at the site and its opening entry reads:-

"A record for all those who pass by this place on this magnificent mountain. Commenced Saturday May 13th, 1961".

The party spent the Saturday night in the old University Hut with a roaring log fire to take the chill out of the early winter air.

At dawn on the Sunday morning, on leaving the hut, John Power and I were struck with the sight of the Morning Star shining large and bright in the grey sky just above the crest of the East Peak somewhat towards the North Peaks, the reverse of the way we had visualised it for the Club badge.

As we started to climb the dark slopes of the East Peak to gain the summit for sunrise, the West Peak was just beginning to turn golden under the first light of the day, while overhead two great eagles were planing in the updraft of the fresh cold air blowing up the slopes of the mountain.

This was the inspiration of the poem which John Power wrote in Ireland, just before commencing his studies for the Priesthood at the Abbey at Loughrea, County Galway.
