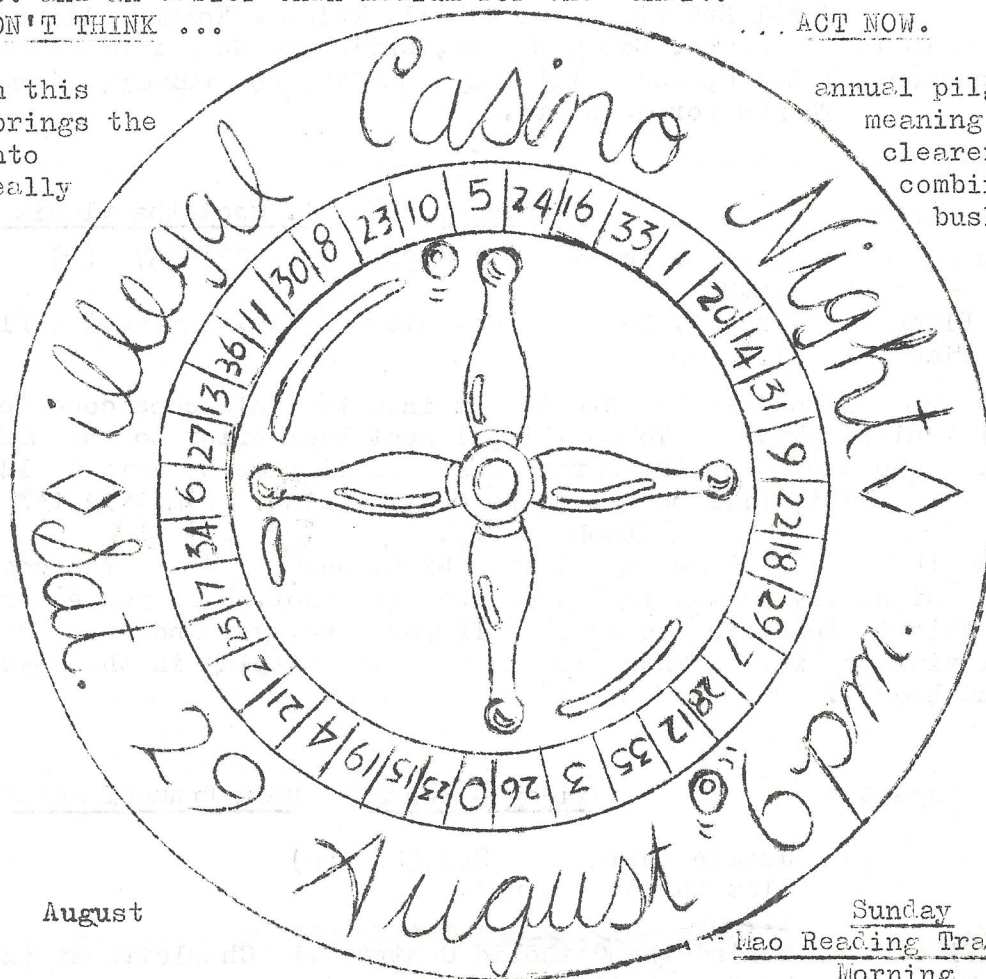

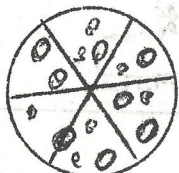
By popular demand, I have slipped this into the Club's Calendar. The story so far.....

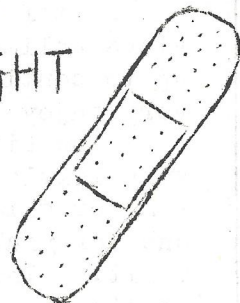

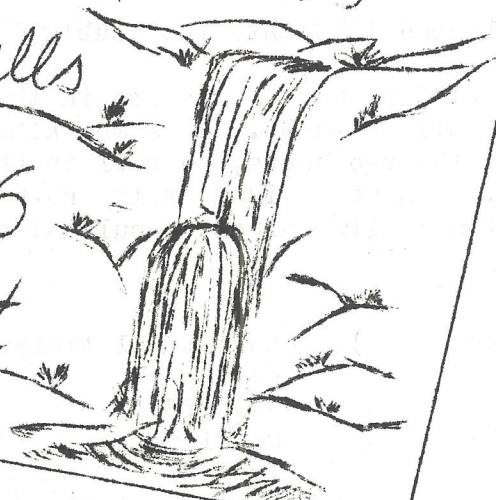

"DON'T GET LOST IN THE BUSH" 1865 Style

The following is an extract from the Port Denison Times of 28th January 1865, page 3, written by G. Lang:

1. As soon as you discover yourself astray, sit down and quietly consider what course you should take and do not be flurried. When you have made up your mind, go straight ahead and never change your course on any sudden impulse, but only after sitting down and carefully considering your position.
2. When you find yourself utterly lost, stop at once and wait for your friends to find you. If you cannot do that -
3. Never leave a road once you come to it, it must lead somewhere.
4. If you come to a fence, stick to it, it must lead somewhere.
5. Find a watercourse and follow it down - not in the channel, but in sight, cutting off the bends; it must lead to open country.
6. Always at short intervals cast your eyes upon the ground around you (taking care not to alter your course).

THE FOSSICKERS MAY

It all started when . . .  
A Scot known as Alexander Campbell ventured to Australia in 1824 to be employed by Peter Macintyre who had taken up land in the Hunter Valley. In March 1835 he sent Campbell on a long and hazardous journey across the Great Dividing Range into the unexplored region of New England. After travelling through Guyra and Bundarra he established Byron Station for his employer and selected a grant of land which he called Inverell Station for himself.

The Fossickers Way cont'd:

This homestead was on the site called Swanbrook and he called it Inverell which in Gaelic means meeting place of the swans, typified in the old Inverell Crests.

The town off Inverell began when Colin and Rosanna Ross built the first store in August 1853, thus attracting settlers to the district. Ross Hill derives its name from the family and many streets are called after their children.

It is a picturesque town situated on a bend in the Macintyre River and it is a friendly town and nestles in a beautiful quiet region away from the rush of the major New England and Newell Highways. It has a comfortable population of 10,000 residents with its shire numbers reaching 17,000.

It is called the Sapphire City because approximately 80% of the world's sapphires are mined in this region and many other gemstones and minerals exist here, so it is a mecca for fossickers.

Inverell is the centre of the area known as The Fossickers Way. It includes also the towns of Barraba, Bingara, Gilgai, Tingha and Glen Innes and all the smaller villages within the region. For rock-hounds and gemfossickers the area has numerous little pockets which contain Sapphires, Zircons, Topaz, Diamonds, gold, silver, tin, jelly beans, quartz, grass stone, agate, rhodonite, tourmaline, petrified wood and almost anything else you can think of.

So if it's a bit of fossicking you feel like just point yourself in that direction and don't be afraid to ask questions.

PAST EVENTS:Lizard Ridge Throughwalk3/5 July"Wouldn't Have Missed It For Quids"

A cold, crisp morning greeted us beside Wild Cattle Creek. Mt. Neilson was our first objective, so we traversed the grain of the land through open grazing country. The grassy western slopes were quite steep and large mature red gum, iron bark and bloodwood trees grew here. Near the summit we entered stands of elegant grass trees. Views of the Main Range and the Passifern Valley were superb, with the peaks outlined against the clear blue skies.

Before us lay Lizard Ridge connecting Mt. Neilson to Lizard Point. With Justin, Mark and John B., I descended to a low saddle, passing a sheltered gully covered in giant spear lillies. A flock of wood swallows feeding on nectar from red gums entertained us.

Lizard Ridge offered us a wide variety of experiences, great views and attractive vegetation. There are steep slopes, narrow sections, rocky razorbacks, mature eucalypt forests, beautiful heath flowers, with the cliffs of Lizard Point beckoning you closer. One of the best ridges of the Scenic Rim. After passing a couple of knolls we enjoyed a late lunch on the third. Shortly at the base of the cliffs of Lizard Point we continued right and eventually scrambled up on to the Divide.

Camp was made at sunset. The colours of sunrise spread over the valleys and mountains. Today we were to join the Overnights at Panorama Point. Passing through damp rainforest we made for Mt. Steamer, then down to the Saddle for water and smoko. A beautiful stand of walking stick palms grew here. Then onwards past bracken fern saddle with its blackberry and cheese cutter (leg cutter) vines to Davies Ridge. A beaut day for walking.

With Lower Panorama Point above us, we headed off, arriving in time for lunch with the other walkers, Cups of tea and goodies all round. The Steamers and Emu Valley lay before us to the south.

The descent of Panorama Ridge provides great views to enjoy as you lose height. With regret we were back in Wild Cattle Valley. The spirit of allmembers was high after a great walk on the Main Range.

Further along the track, a member of the party went missing, lost, fallen and unconscious or what? They had simply taken a wrong turn - on purpose of course, and while the rest of the party discussed navigation our lost member took a short-cut ahead of us.

Different strategies were discussed throughout the day, while walking through the bush, looking for the imaginary and missing John Smith. A beautiful moon rose and as the views took in Mt. Barney, May Maroon and many other, it would have been the perfect end to a good day. A day made even better by the top meal, a campfire and socializing with members from some of the other clubs.

The next day was as eventful with a concussion, hyperthermia, a broken arm, sprained ankle and spinal injury - all fake I'm pleased to say.

Once again it was a very worthwhile weekend.
