As one approaches Ayers Rock, through the shimmering haze of Australias "Red Centre" ones first impression of this monarch of the desert is its sheer enormity. It lays like a gargantuan scone thrust from the undulating emptiness of the desert and scattered scrub.

Situated approximately 300 km south-east of Alice Springs in Central Australia, Ayers Rock was first discovered and named by William Gosse in 1872. It is 8.8 km in circumference, 3.6km long and 2.4 km wide. It's height above ground level is 348 metres and above sea level 867 metres. The formation plunges to a minimum depth of 2000 metres and possibly to a maximum of 3000 metres. Ayers Rock is a insolberg consisting of ankure outcrop in a large plain. It was formed in pre-historic times from the sedimentary deposits of some once great mountain chain many kilometres away when much of Central Australia was an inland sea.

Each year "The Rock" draws thousands of visitors from Australia and around the world to view and climb its almost perpendicular sides. Ayers Rock is now incorporated in the Ayers Rock - Mt. Olga National Park. The tourist are well catered for at the park with many fine motels or for the more intrepid well appointed camping grounds. The winter months are the ideal time to visit the park as in summer temperatures in the desert can reach as high as 44° C.

Although the existence of Ayers Rock has been known to the white man for only a short period of time. "The Rock" has played a significant part in the mythological beliefs and customs of the aborigines, in particular the Pitjantjatjara tribe, since the beginning of time. The many caves dotted around the base of "The Rock" bare witness to these customs and beliefs.

The Aborigines believed that in the beginning was the "Dreamtime". The earth was flat and devoid of all marks. There were neither trees nor rivers nor mountains. Then in the time of "Tjukurapa" or creation, the essence of life stirred in the land. The "Tjukurapa" people moved about the land and by their actions, and in some places their bodies, created the substance of the earth itself.

The southern face of the rock commemorates a battle between the Liru (poisonous snake) and Kunia (carpet snake) people; the campsites of Linga (the sand lizard) who searched for the boomerang of light; the death place of Metalungana (the sleeping lizard) who died in fire.

The northern and north-westerly face holds the marks of the Mala (hare-wallaby or desert kangaroo-rat) who were the tragic victims of Kulpunva the spirit-dingo made of sticks; and of Tjinderi-tjinderiba, the willie-wag tail woman and her host of children; and of others who played their part in creation and death.

What ever the reason for visiting Ayers Rock one will not leave this place without being moved by its grandeur or awe inspired by its size and colour in particular at sunset, when the rays of sunlight shafting almost horizontally across the land from the flat circle of the sky, catch "The Rock" and make it glow unbelievably above the shadowy trees, in an unreal vision, as though the gigantic top has stored the colour from the sun itself and flung it back in defiance of the night.

OUTINGS - IN - RETROSPECT

Saturday morning found us up at about 5.30 (well some of us). With the sun shining irregularly, we set off up the Commando Track, joining on to the Kerry Track and following it up to Luke's Bluff. The views from here were quite good and would be really spectacular on a more clear day. the rain beginning to fall, we moved on from here up to Pat's Bluff and then on to O'Reillys where we had a goody stop at the shop. After finally dragging the troops away from the shop, we followed the graded track system for some 4 miles before branching off to the blazed trail which eventually took us down to the Albert River, after much slipping and sliding. We had a very late lunch when we reached the River before leaving our packs and rock-hopping up the creek in search of Lightning and Thunder Falls. Unfortunately it was getting late, so we about-faced and went back to our packs and continued on in search of a camping spot. To everyone's dismay, we were forced to swim through the freezing water in Red Rock Cutting. After another hour's walking we stopped to camp for the night.
