Bushwalking Details: This high sandstone plateau, part of which is presently in the process of becoming a National Park, is situated some 150 kilometres inland from Rockhampton, south of the Capricorn Highway. The Tableland makes up the northern part of the "Expedition Ranges", where the Dawson and Shotover Ranges join it.

While the highest parts of the Tableland are over 900m high the attraction is not the peaks but the creeks which dissect the Tableland with deep gorges. Fed by springs, these creeks have many deep, still pools as they flow through the undulating Tableland country with its forests and heath-like vegetation. They then plunge into deep palm and fern-filled gorges via cascades and waterfalls up to 200m high. It is possible to climb down some of these waterfalls and swim in the pools below while other falls have sheer drops which make descent very difficult.

We will be camping on Nimosa Creek and looking at its attractions on the Friday. On saturday we will walk out to Stoney Creek Falls and some of the party may return via Spring Creek. After Mass on Sunday we will visit Rainbow Creek Falls, definitely

one of THE beauty spots of Queensland. On Monday we will be driving back to Brisbane, possibly via the Burnett Highway.

Water should be readily available at the campsite. Remember to bring food for $3\frac{1}{2}$ days. The temperature should be warm to hot during the day (bring togs:!) but can be surprisingly cool at night - for Central Queensland - so don't forget your sleeping bag or blankets.

The night was very peaceful and fresh after it was over.
