This, our first through walk of the year is a very suitable one to open the season. Not unduly strenuous, it provides diversified scenery ranging from the dairylands of the coastal plain to the rain forested cliff lines of the Springbrook massif. Mounts Tallebudgera, Cougal and the "Three Sisters" like, Boyd's Buttes, are particularly prominent on the walk. The upper reaches of Tallebudgera Creek are very pretty and the waterfalls and lookouts of Springbrook are too well known to need elaboration. It is always rewarding to follow a stream to its source and then to follow the ridges up to the mountain tops and this delightful walk will be no exception.

As there are practically no trees on the summit surprisingly satisfying vistas of the surrounding pinetree plantations can be obtained. An easy trip but a worthwhile one. Bring extra tucker for tea as the train reaches Brisbane about 8.0p.m.

ANNUAL ELECTIONS.

Any two financial members for year 1962/1963 may nominate and second any other financial member for any of the above positions. The person nominated, however, must acknowledge by his signature in the space provided hereunder that he is willing to accept such nomination.

A short explanation of the procedure may be in order. If you are not interested in nominating anybody, do not take any action at all. If you wish to nominate one person only for, say, Treasurer, and no other position, merely insert his name opposite "Treasurer" as nominee, have him sign the next space, have your seconder sign the third space and put your own signature at the space provided at the immediate commencement of the form. If you wish to nominate the one person for every position down to and including Committee number one, you can do so, but signatures are required against each position. You can nominate different people for all ten positions if you obtain their authority and a seconder but you should not nominate a person for a position on your own form and second somebody else for the same position on another person's form. This would mean that you hope two different people win the same position. In conclusion do not be afraid to nominate people as we need the best to look after Club interests. Voting is by secret ballot, so have no embarrassment over the number of votes you or your nominee will score. No one else will ever know.

GET UP AND GO.

In a recent issue of "Bushwalking News" we considered a few matters in setting up camp for new members. This perhaps was putting the cart before the horse and we will deal with equipment and provisions in this issue.

Bushwalking is perhaps the cheapest recreation as far as equipment is concerned. The minimum equipment to enjoy a weekend is far less costly than the gear to indulge in other occupations such as golf, water ski-ing, cricket or similar field sports. What is the essential equipment? The first requisite is of course a tent. Experienced swaggies and deadbeats have no complaints or qualms in sleeping under railway bridges or the trees in Musgrave Park, but bushwalkers do not camp in close proximity to railway lines very often, and almost certainly never indulge in a night cap of metho to keep out the wet and cold of a chilly evening. Shelter is therefore of maximum importance. Tents can be purchased from about £3. 0. 0, upwards and the ideal tent must be waterproof, windproof, reasonably strong and, most importantly, easily erected.

The writer feels that Japara silk is still the best material for tent construction and also thinks that white or orange is the best colour scheme to adopt. A green tent looks very suitable for colour photography but is inclined to blend too realistically into the background when a tired party is seeking the camp spot after a hard days trip. Particularly is this so in rain forest. As far as shape is concerned, it should be remembered that sleeping space and not standing space is all important in bushwalking tents and finally the test is whether it completely keeps out rain and wind.

What other equipment is essential for the first few trips? As far as purchasable items are concerned, the answer is nothing. A rucksack is not necessary on base camps and even a suitcase would suffice provided it can stand getting wet. Blankets may be prickly and are certainly bulky, but a lot of people use them for the first trips as sleeping bags vary in price and once it is decided that bushwalking does appeal it is wise to buy the best you can afford as it will be much warmer and more compact than cheaper ones.
